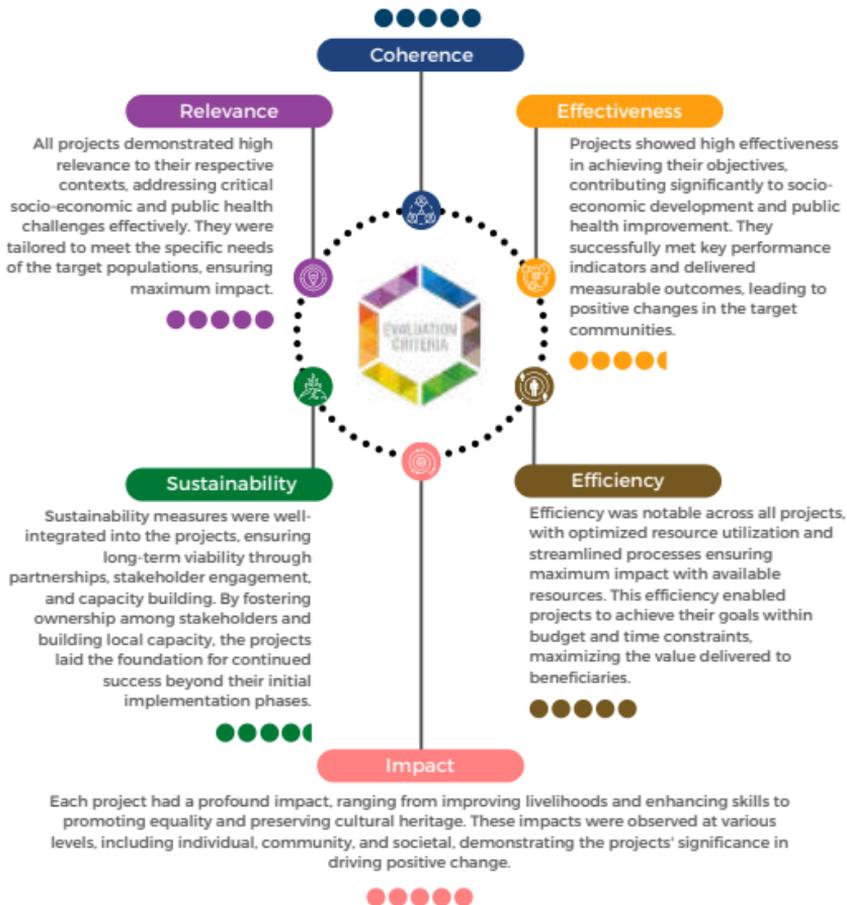

CHAPTER 2

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY



KEC commissioned SoulAce to conduct an impact assessment study to evaluate the immediate and enduring impacts of the program implemented under the Employability CSR theme. The impact assessment study was conducted in the fiscal year FY 2023-24.

Objectives of the study



To evaluate the immediate and enduring impacts of CSR program implemented by KEC.



To assess the effectiveness of the program in achieving its intended goals and objectives.



To measure the effectiveness of the program in addressing key employability challenges faced by participants.



To identify strengths and areas for improvement in the program implementation process



To provide recommendations for enhancing the program's impact and sustainability in the future.

Definition of Research

Research can be described as a logical and systematic search for new and useful information on a particular subject matter. Social science research refers to the systematic activity of gaining new understanding by following scientific principles and methods to minimize bias and subjectivity. It is contrary to writing something based on assumptions or speculations. Though information on certain facts can also be gained through common sense and based on general observation and hearsay, those facts will not be considered valid until they have been obtained in a methodical manner, which can stand the test of time.

The defining characteristics of scientific research are objectivity, ethical neutrality, reliability, testability and transparency. The identification of the research problem provides the starting point of research, which is then defined and redefined through a proper review of the literature on the problem or deliberations with research experts and knowledgeable others in the subject matter of interest. Each research problem has a multitude of perspectives and dimensions, and research cannot cover all of those in a single study. Thus, we need to delimit the research problem into a 'measurable problem and formulate objectives, make decisions on the research design, sample design, type of research instruments for collecting the data, and how these data can be edited, coded, classified, tabulated, and interpreted so that findings and conclusions can be reached'. Every research needs to have a proper methodology to foresee the problems that could arise in the process and steer through it in a proper direction without losing focus.

Use of Mixed Methodology for maximum insights

The research problem pertained to assessing the impact of this initiative on local communities. The project's success lies in understanding how this initiative has positively influenced the lives of individuals within the local communities, including their economic well-being, social integration, and overall quality of life. It aims to measure the tangible and intangible benefits brought about by the initiative and evaluate its effectiveness in addressing the needs and challenges of the target population.

Application of Quantitative Techniques

A quantitative study is needed when the focus is on presenting the study problem in terms of numbers, frequencies, percentages, etc. In quantitative research, standardized instruments such as questionnaires and interview schedules are employed to collect data. Though the information that is obtained is easily amenable to various statistical measures and tests, quantitative information has its limitations. It can uncover only the surface phenomena. It is unable to penetrate beneath the surface and identify what is hidden.

In this study, structured tools like the interview schedule were used to assess the impact. This helped in obtaining quantifiable information.

Application of Qualitative Techniques

Qualitative research can only unravel enriched and hidden information that may not be evident on the face of it. The qualitative approach is distinguished by deeper probing and flexibility, and it can yield massive amounts of data that were not anticipated when the research was initiated. Quantitative techniques were used for better accuracy, to ensure anonymity, and, at the same time, to cover a larger sample population. Qualitative techniques of interviews with key stakeholders and interviews with community people were adopted for a better understanding of the problem alongside quantitative research.

Project Evaluation Framework

After the collection of relevant information and perceptions through interviews, the OECD framework would be followed/applied. It has six evaluation criteria - relevance, coherence, efficiency, effectiveness, impact, and sustainability for each of the indicators.



Ensuring Triangulation

Triangulation was needed to increase the credibility and validity of the research findings. It was also a measure taken to ensure the trustworthiness of the research process. The findings of the quantitative research have been verified with the insights from qualitative research, and the report has also been structured to reflect this point.

Study Tools

Tools used during the study

SoulAce has developed a mobile application platform for quantitative data collection. The field team used this app to undertake the study. This application has real-time data entry and data upload features with GPS location details along with a questionnaire for interaction with the project beneficiaries; the application has a provision to take pictures of each respondent.

Primary data was collected using two types of questionnaires.



Questionnaire for Primary Beneficiaries:

Structured questionnaires were developed, the project details for each of the focus areas were reviewed, and indicators were pre-defined before conducting the surveys.



Questionnaire for Secondary Beneficiaries and Stakeholders:

Semi-structured questionnaires were developed for each type of sample of this group. Stakeholders were identified across the focus areas.

One-on-one discussions were done with beneficiaries to prepare case studies.

The results were revealed only as an aggregate, so no one would not be able to single out the identity of a particular respondent. This was required to not break the trust of the respondent by not revealing the individual identity.



Confidentiality

Research subjects participate in the process only based on the trust that confidentiality is maintained. Hence, the research would not reveal any data regarding the respondents for purposes other than the research study.



Non-Maleficence

Research would not lead to harm to the research subjects. This study ensured that the respondents were not harmed in any way.



Beneficence

Any research study should lead to some benefits for the respondent. This research study also ensures that individuals, groups, and communities benefit and their well-being is enhanced.



Justice

Justice refers to being fair to all. This research study ensures equal treatment of all its research subjects and no biases or prejudices towards any group based on social stereotypes or stigma associated with being a member of a certain group or class.

Ensuring Commitment to Research Ethics



Anonymity

Anonymity refers to not revealing the identity of the respondents. This research study strictly sticks to not revealing the identity of respondents unless the same is warranted for the illustration of success stories or case studies. After the research was completed, the study did not reveal which individual respondents answered which question in what manner.

CHART 1: AGE GROUP WISE DISTRIBUTION

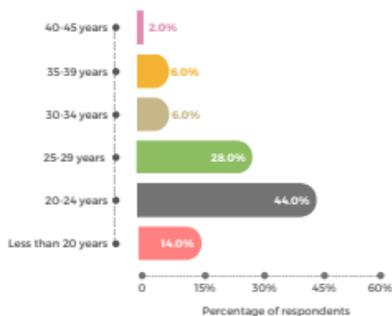

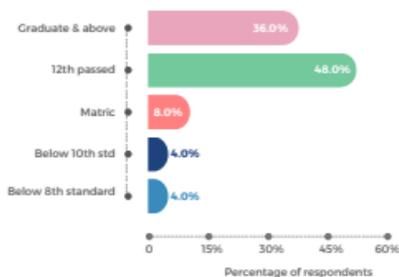
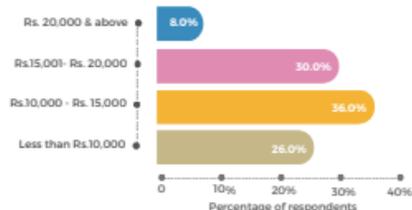


CHART 3: MONTHLY INCOME



The demographic profile of beneficiaries participating in the Swayam Health program unveiled several key insights. With a combined significant majority (72%) falling within the 20-29 age group, the initiative strategically targeted empowering the younger demographic, aligning with their aspirations for skill development and employment. A significant portion of beneficiaries completed their Class XII grades (48%) or are graduates with above qualifications (17.6%). Furthermore, the data reveals that the majority (36%) have a monthly income of Rs. 10,000 - 20,000.

CHART 4: SALARY OF THE RESPONDENTS BEFORE AND AFTER JOINING THE COURSE

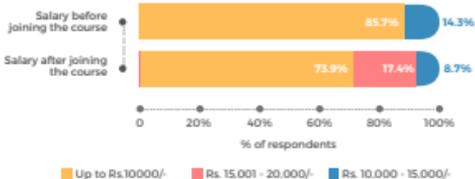
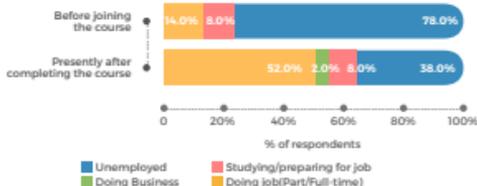

Before the implementation of the program, a significant majority (78%) were unemployed before joining the skill development program, indicating a considerable need for employment opportunities. The program successfully addressed this area and was able to cut down unemployment by a striking 40%.

Additionally, before enrolling in the course, a significant majority (85.7%) of respondents earned up to Rs. 10,000/-, reflecting a prevalent low-income scenario among participants. However, after completing the program, there was a decrease in the percentage of respondents earning in this lowest income bracket, dropping to 73.9%. Conversely, there was a slight increase in the percentage of respondents earning between Rs. 10,000 - 15,000/- after course completion (rising from 14.3% to 17.4%). Furthermore, a new category emerged after joining the course, with 8.7% of respondents now earning between Rs. 15,001 and 20,000/-.

This data suggested that the Swayam Health program has contributed to improving the income levels of participants, with a notable proportion transitioning to higher salary brackets post-training, indicating the program's effectiveness in enhancing economic opportunities for its beneficiaries.

CHART 6: SOURCE OF INFORMATION ABOUT THE SKILL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

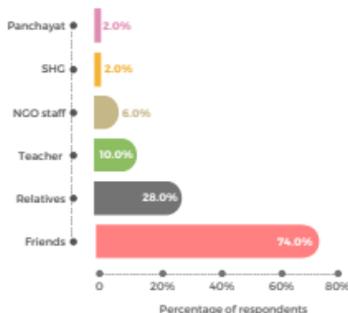
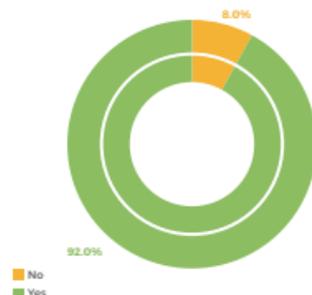

CHART 8: COURSE ATTENDED BY RESPONDENTS

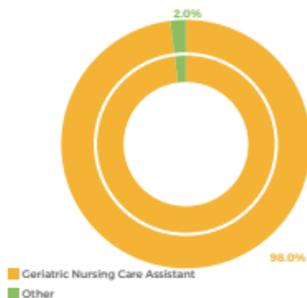


CHART 10: WHETHER RECEIVED CERTIFICATE?

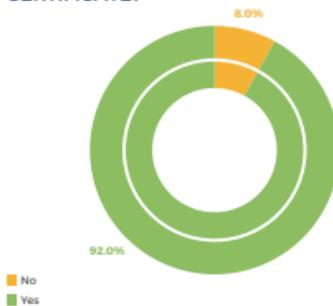


CHART 9: MODE OF CONDUCTING CLASSES



CHART 11: WHAT WAS THE PERCENTAGE OF MARKS YOU OBTAINED IN THE FINAL ASSESSMENT

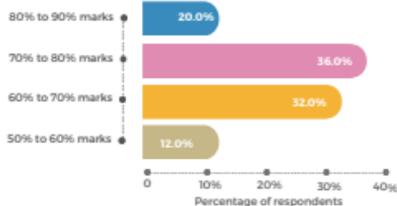
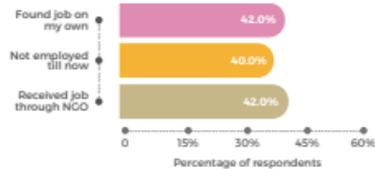
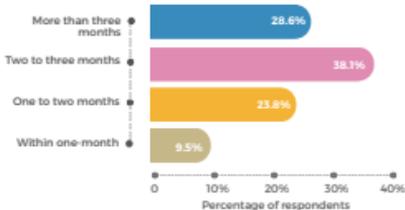
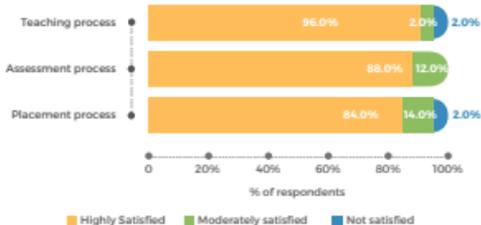

Almost all respondents (98%) participated in the Geriatric Nursing Care Assistant course, indicating a strong preference for this specific skill development track. Physical classes were overwhelmingly preferred (96%) over online classes, suggesting a strong inclination toward traditional, in-person learning. A notable section (92%) received certificates indicating the program's effectiveness in delivering and recognizing participant achievements.

Most participants excelled in the final assessment (with a combined 56%) and scored between 70% and 90% marks. While nearly half (42%) have received job placements through the NGO, a considerable section (40%) is not employed through this channel, awaiting placement. A significant section (38.1%) secured employment took two to three months, indicating varying dates for securing placements. The respondents expressed satisfaction with their training, including the teaching (96%), assessment (88%), and placement processes (84%) that highlighted the overall positive experience and contentment derived from the program.

CHART 15: POSITIVE CHANGES NOTICED IN THE LIVING STANDARD

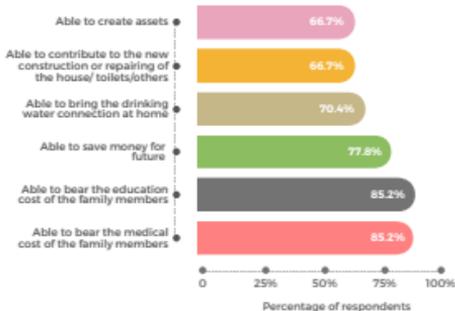
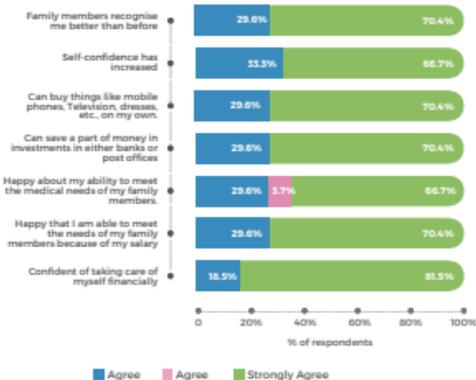


CHART 16: CHANGES EXPERIENCED DUE TO FINDING EMPLOYMENT



The data illustrates positive changes in the living standards of respondents following their participation in the Swayam Health program. A significant majority (85.2%) reported being able to bear the medical expenses of their family members, indicating improved financial stability and access to healthcare services. Similarly, an equal proportion (85.2%) stated they were now able to cover the educational expenses of their family members, reflecting enhanced opportunities for educational advancement within their households. Furthermore, a major section (77.8%) reported being able to save money for the future, highlighting improved financial planning and security.

Overall, these findings suggest that the Swayam Health program has had a positive impact on the socio-economic status and living standards of its beneficiaries, enabling them to meet essential needs, plan for the future, and invest in their households' well-being.

Additionally, most of the respondents (70.4%) expressed happiness about their ability to meet the needs of their family members because of their salary, underscoring the improved socio-economic support provided to their families. Overall, these findings indicate that finding employment has brought about significant positive changes in the financial, social, and psychological well-being of respondents, contributing to their overall quality of life and self-perception.

CHART 17: SATISFACTION LEVEL OF THE BENEFICIARY RELATED TO THE JOB

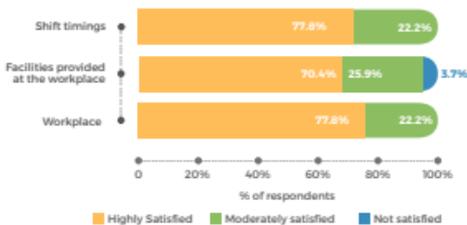


CHART 18: DURATION OF CONTINUING THE JOB PLACED BY THE CENTRE

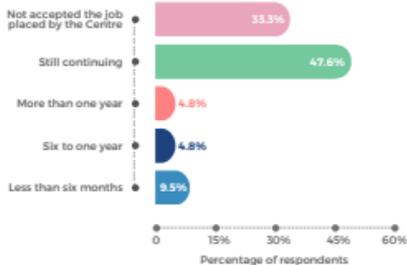

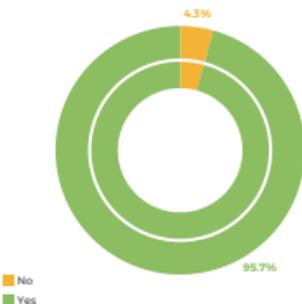
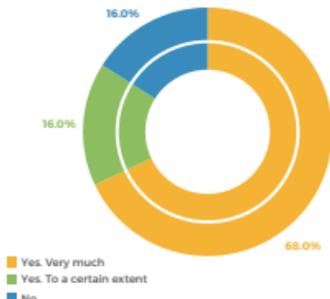


CHART 20: WHETHER THE RESPONDENTS HAD MADE THE RIGHT DECISION BY JOINING THE COURSE?

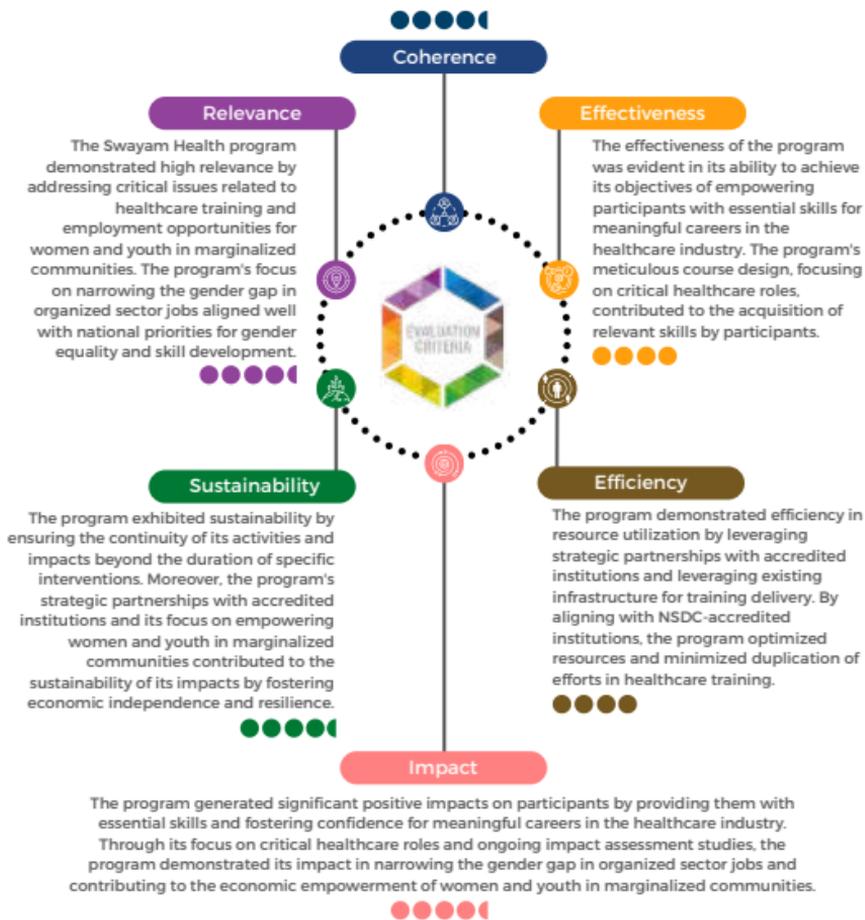

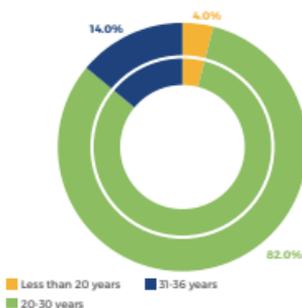


CHART 2: GENDER WISE DISTRIBUTION

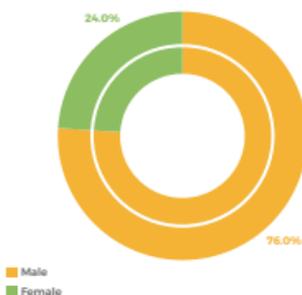

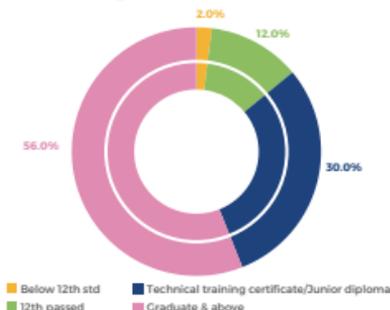
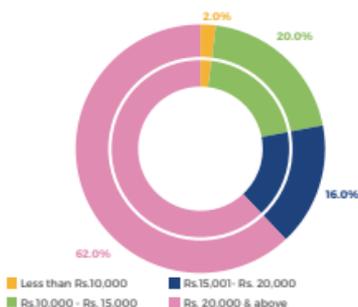


CHART 4: MONTHLY INCOME

CHART 5: OCCUPATIONAL STATUS BEFORE JOINING THE COURSE

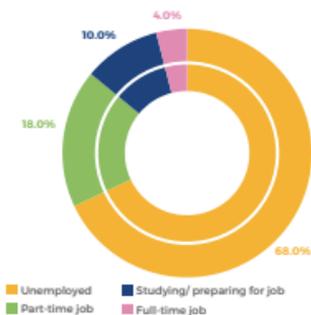
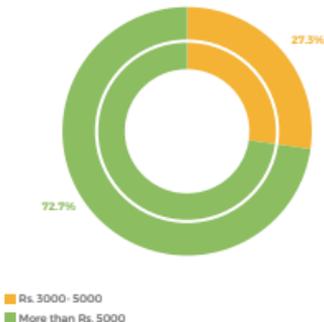


CHART 6: INCOME BEFORE JOINING, IF PREVIOUSLY EMPLOYED

CHART 7: SOURCE OF INFORMATION ABOUT THE ENROLLED SKILL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

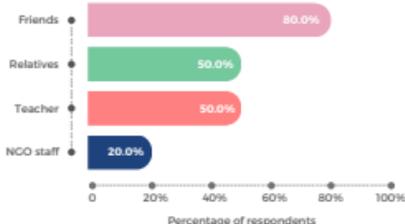


CHART 8: WHETHER AN ORIENTATION SESSION CONDUCTED BEFORE THE START OF THE COURSE?

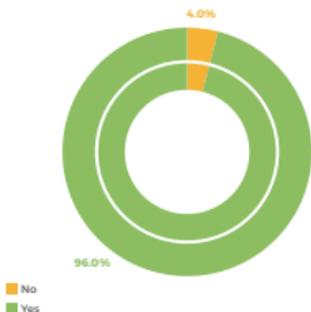
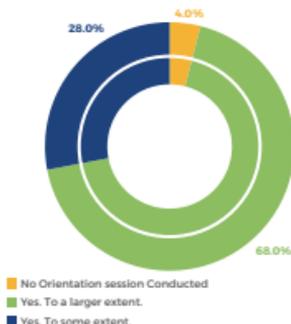

CHART 10: NAME OF THE COURSE ENROLLED

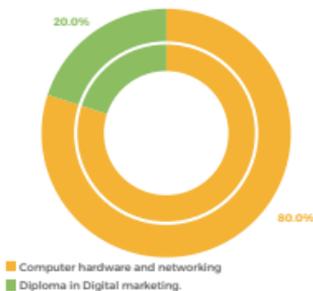


CHART 11: FREQUENCY OF THE CLASSES IN A WEEK

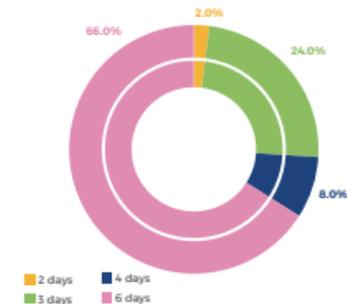


CHART 12: DURATION OF THEORY AND PRACTICAL CLASSES

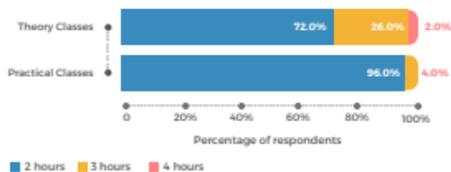


CHART 13: PERCENTAGE OF MARKS IN THE FINAL ASSESSMENT

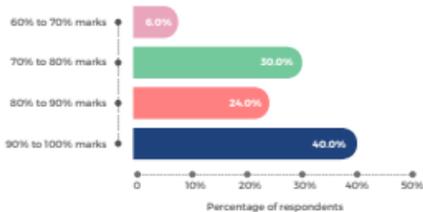
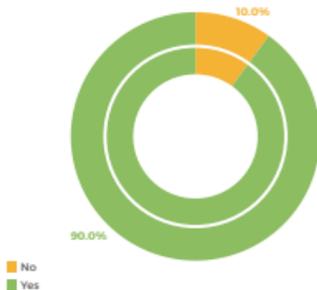


CHART 14: WHETHER RECEIVED THE CERTIFICATE?

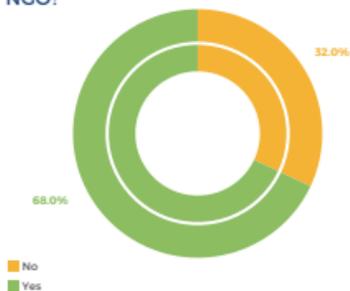
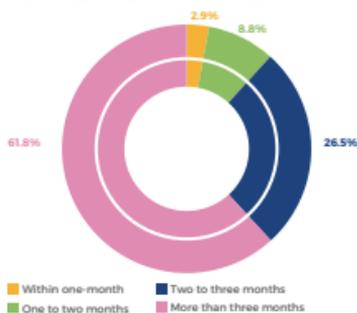
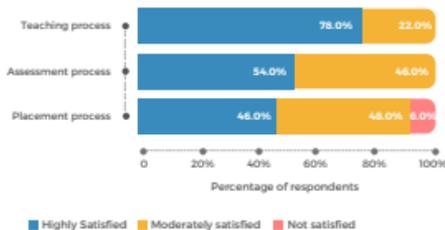

A substantial majority (80%) enrolled in the Computer Hardware and Networking course, indicating a strong demand for technical skills in this domain preferences. The frequency of classes varied, with the majority (66%) experiencing a robust six-day schedule, emphasizing the program's commitment to intensive learning. Moreover, a significant majority (72%) reported a duration of two hours, showcasing a concentrated yet manageable approach to theoretical learning. Practical classes predominantly spanned two hours (96%), aligning with an emphasis on hands-on application of acquired knowledge.

A well-distributed performance spectrum was observed, with less than half (40%) of participants scoring 90% to 100% marks, followed by 70% to 80% range (30%). A high certificate attainment rate (90%) indicated the majority of participants completed the program requirements. A majority (60%) reported having enough scope to interact with teachers for doubt-clearing, showcasing a supportive learning environment. A substantial majority (68%) received job placement support from the NGO, showcasing a proactive approach to facilitating employment opportunities. A significant section (61.8%) secured employment took more than three months, while a little more than a quarter (26.5%) had to wait two to three months, which indicated varying durations for securing placements. CHART 19: PRESENT EMPLOYMENT STATUS

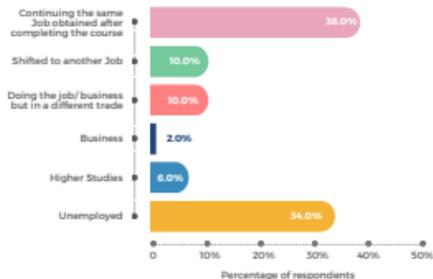


CHART 20: SALARY AFTER JOINING THE COURSE

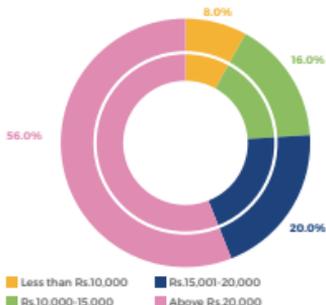
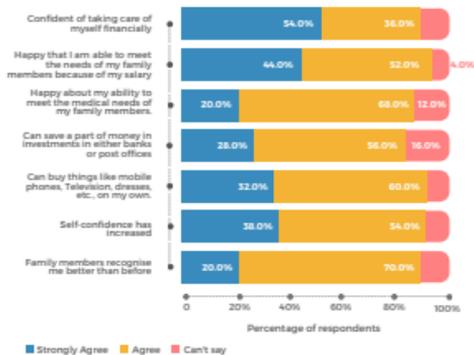


CHART 21: CHANGES EXPERIENCED DUE TO FINDING EMPLOYMENT

CHART 22: SATISFACTION LEVEL OF THE BENEFICIARY RELATED TO THE JOB

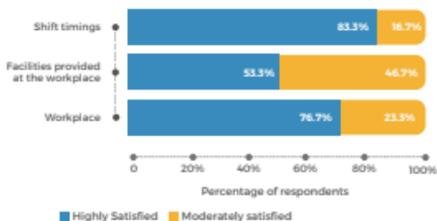


CHART 23: DURATION OF CONTINUING THE JOB PLACED BY THE CENTRE

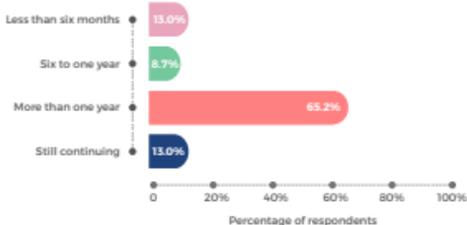

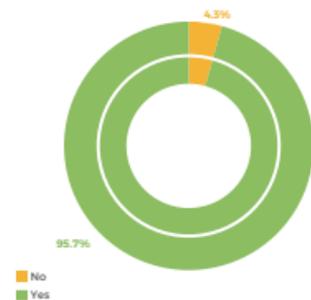

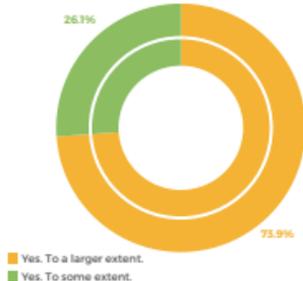


CHART 26: WHETHER THE ASPIRATIONS CHANGED FOR A BETTER JOB/ OR A BETTER FIELD NOW?

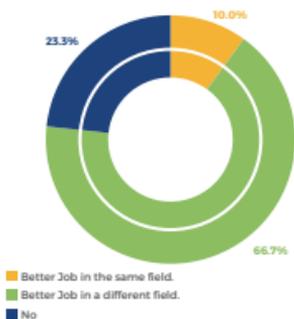
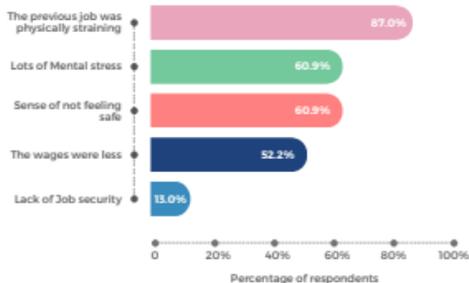


CHART 27: REASON FOR THE CHANGE IN ASPIRATION



The majority of respondents were highly satisfied with shift timings (83.3%) and workplace facilities (76.7%), respectively, indicating contentment with their working conditions. A notable section (65.2%) continued their jobs for more than one year, emphasizing the program's impact on fostering long-term employment. A robust section (96%) affirmed that course lessons were applicable in their workplace, showcasing the program's success in imparting practical skills. The majority (73.9%) felt their job aligned with their initial aspirations to a larger extent. Interestingly, a major section (66.7%) expressed a desire for a better job in a different field, reflecting evolving aspirations for career growth.

The change in aspirations among presently employed respondents could be attributed to various factors. The most common reason, cited by the majority (87%), was that their previous job was physically straining. Additionally, a notable section (60.9%) mentioned experiencing lots of mental stress in their previous jobs, while an equal percentage expressed a sense of not feeling safe in their work environment. Another significant factor contributing to the change in aspirations was dissatisfaction with wages, with more than half (52.2%) indicating that their previous job paid less than desired. Furthermore, a minor section (13%) cited a lack of job security as a reason for their changed aspirations. These findings underscored the multifaceted nature of employment-related aspirations and highlighted the importance of addressing various job-related factors to meet the evolving needs and preferences of the workforce.

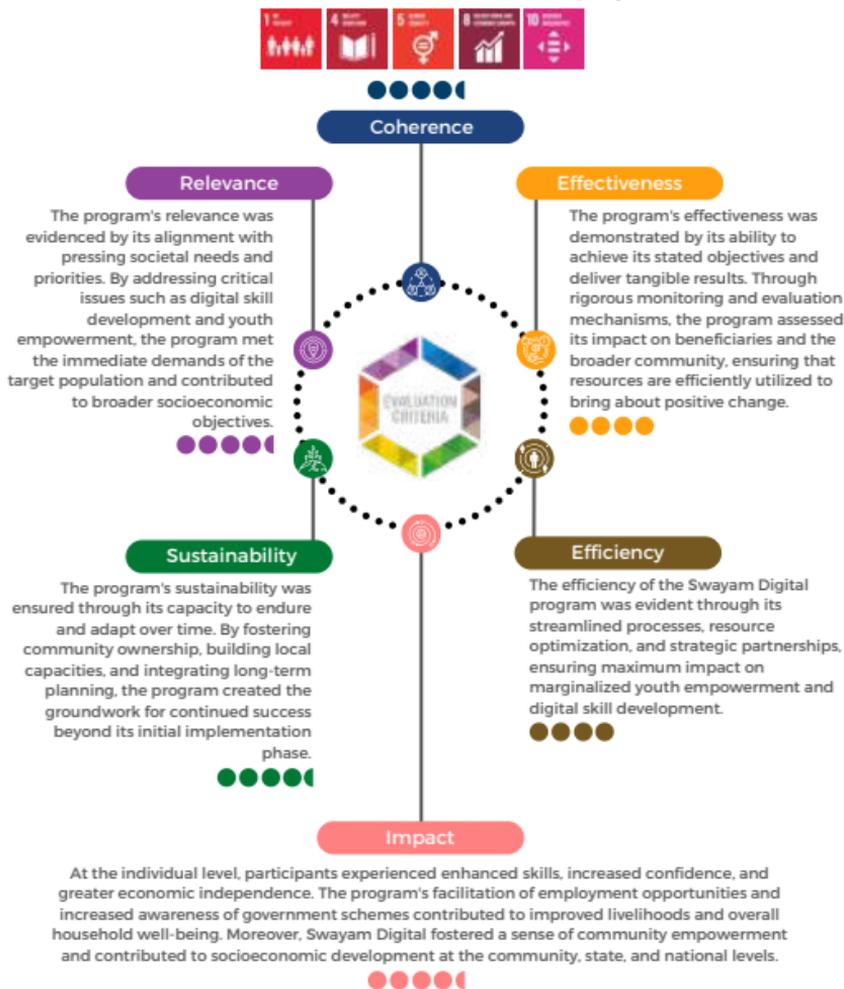

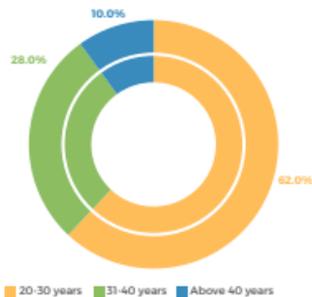


CHART 3: MONTHLY INCOME

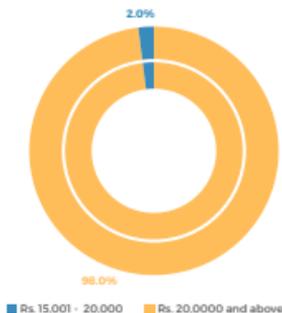

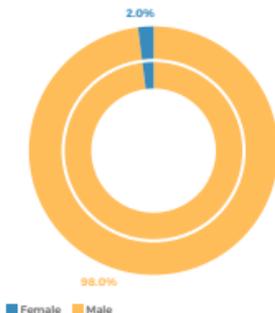
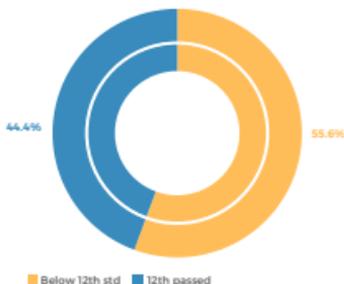


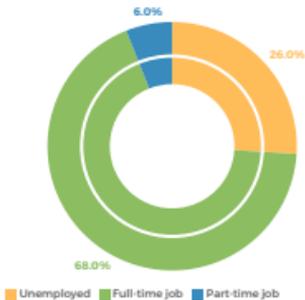
CHART 4: QUALIFICATION

CHART 6: SOURCE OF MOBILIZATION

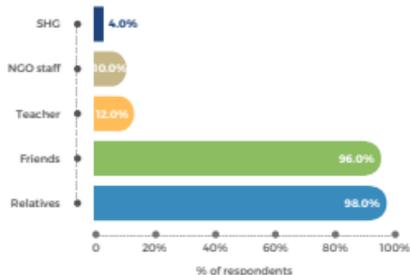
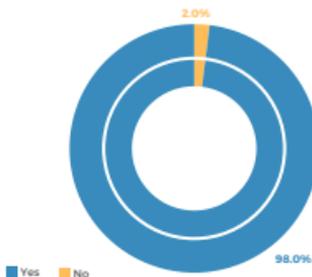


CHART 7: PRE-ADMISSION COUNSELLING

CHART 8: CLASS ATTENDANCE

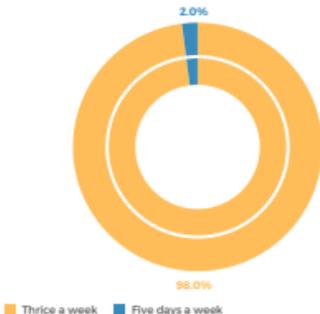


CHART 9: CERTIFICATION

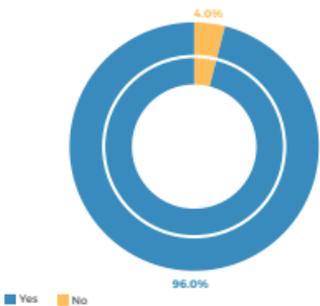


CHART 9: NAME OF COURSE ATTENDED

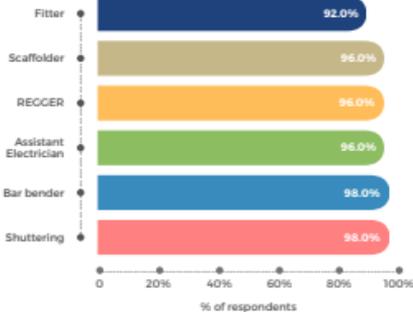


CHART 10: WHETHER RECEIVED PLACEMENT THROUGH NGO

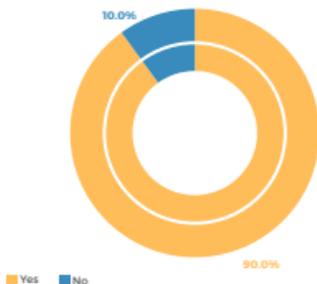


CHART 11: WAITING TIME FOR PLACEMENT

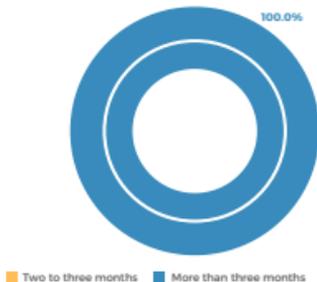
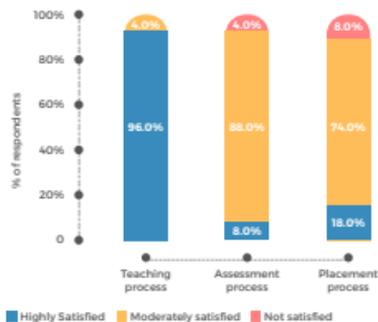


CHART 12: COURSE FEEDBACK



The majority of respondents (98%) attended classes thrice a week, indicating a balanced approach to learning that accommodates other commitments or responsibilities.

A significant percentage of respondents (96%) received certificates upon completing the course, underscoring the program's commitment to recognizing and validating participants' acquired skills and achievements. The most attended courses were Shuttering and Bar Bender (with 98% participation rates), followed closely by Assistant Electrician, RIGGER, and Scaffolder courses (each attended by 96% of respondents). This indicates a diverse range of skills acquired by participants.

A substantial percentage (90%) of respondents received job placements through the NGO, underscoring the effectiveness of the placement assistance provided in facilitating employment opportunities within the construction sector. All employed respondents through the NGO experienced a waiting period of more than three months before securing employment, highlighting potential challenges in immediate job placement despite acquiring skills. CHART 13: PRESENT EMPLOYMENT STATUS

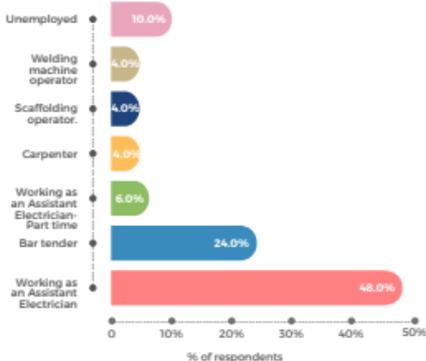
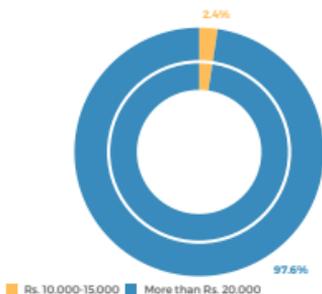


CHART 14: SALARY OF FIRST JOB AFTER COURSE COMPLETION

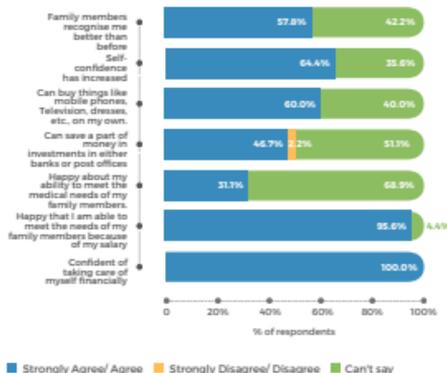

Similarly, a substantial percentage (95.6%) expressed happiness in meeting their family members' needs because of their salary. Around half of the respondents (46.7%) reported being able to save a part of their money in investments such as banks or post offices, highlighting a newfound capacity for financial planning and saving among beneficiaries. CHART 16: SAME INDUSTRY

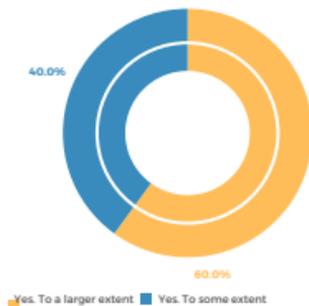


CHART 19: CONTINUING IN THE SAME SECTOR

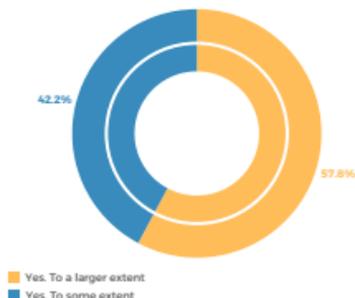


CHART 17: ALIGNMENT BETWEEN TRAINING AND WORK

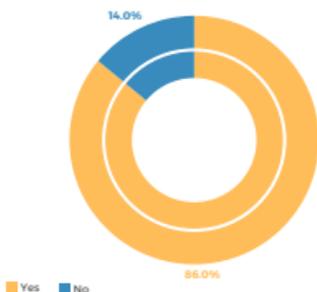


CHART 20: CHANGE OF ASPIRATIONS

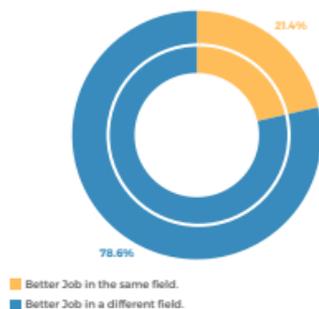
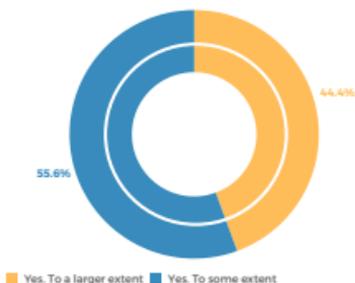


CHART 18: SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS

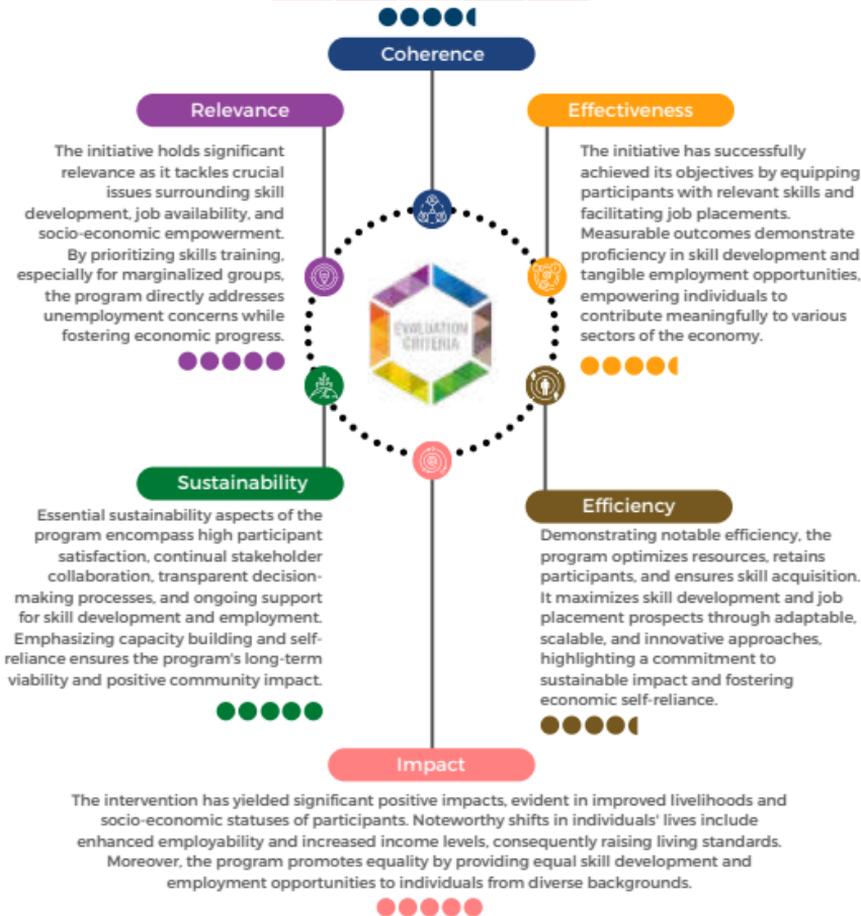

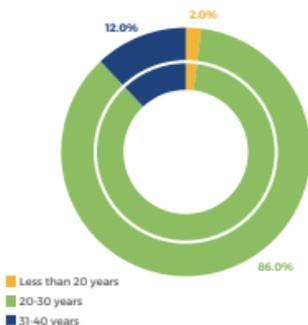


CHART 3: QUALIFICATION

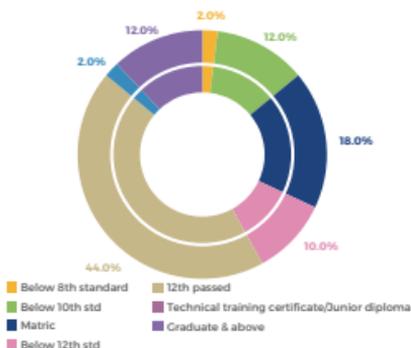


CHART 2: GENDER WISE DISTRIBUTION

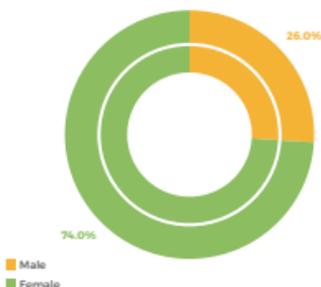
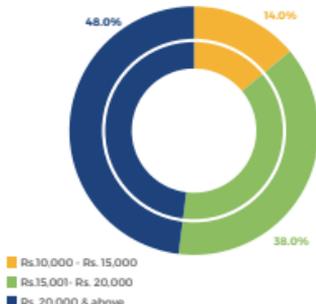


CHART 4: APPROX MONTHLY FAMILY INCOME

CHART 5: OCCUPATION STATUS BEFORE JOINING THE COURSE

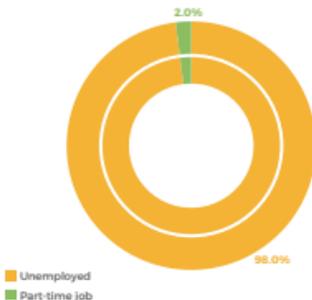
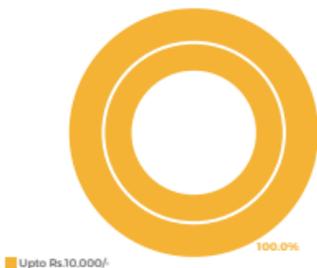


CHART 6: SALARY OF THE RESPONDENTS BEFORE JOINING

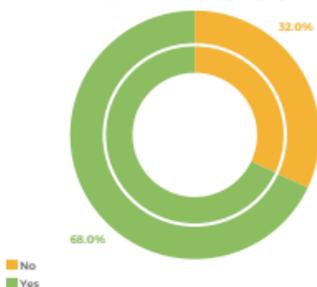

CHART 9: AREAS IN WHICH TRAINING RECEIVED BY THE RESPONDENTS

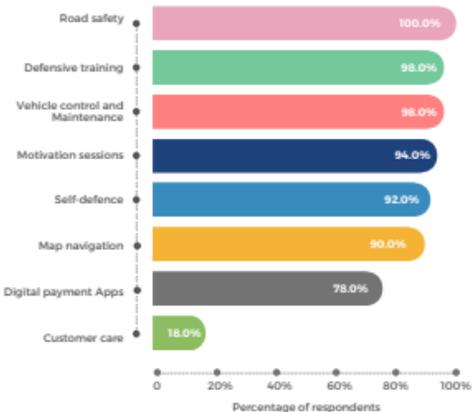


CHART 10: DURATION OF THEORY AND PRACTICAL CLASSES

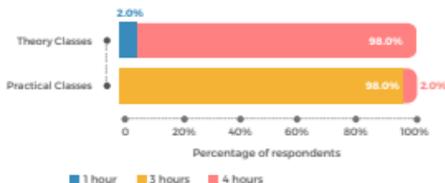


CHART 11: WHETHER RECEIVED THE CERTIFICATE?

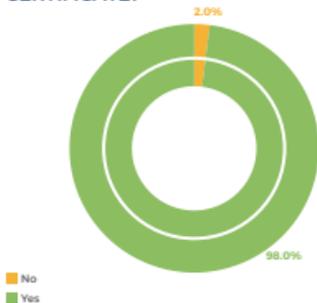


CHART 12: WHETHER RECEIVED JOB PLACEMENT THROUGH THE NGO?

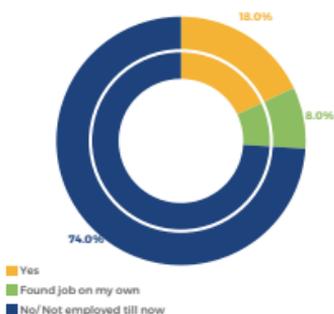


CHART 13: WAITING PERIOD FOR THE PLACEMENT AFTER COMPLETING THE COURSE

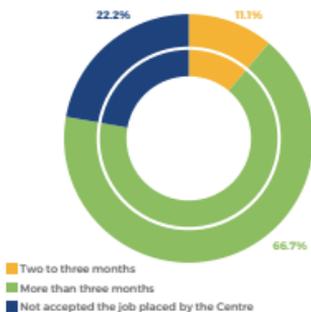
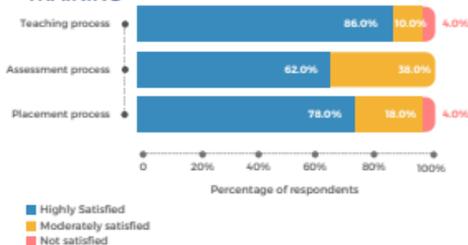


CHART 14: SATISFACTION LEVEL OF THE BENEFICIARY RELATED TO THE TRAINING



The participants received comprehensive training in areas such as road safety, defensive training, vehicle control, maintenance, motivation sessions, self-defence, map navigation, and digital payment apps. Moreover, a significant majority reported the duration of three-hour practical (98%) and four-hour theory classes (98%), showcasing a concentrated yet manageable approach to practical and theoretical learning.

A high certificate attainment rate (90%) indicated the majority of participants successfully completing the program requirements. While less than one-fifth (18%) have received job placements through the NGO, a considerable section (74%) is not employed through this channel, awaiting placement. A significant section (66.7%) secured employment took more than three months, which indicated varying durations for securing placements. The respondents expressed satisfaction with their training, including the teaching (86%), assessment (62%), and placement processes (78%) that highlighted the overall positive experience and contentment derived from the program.

CHART 15: PRESENT EMPLOYMENT STATUS

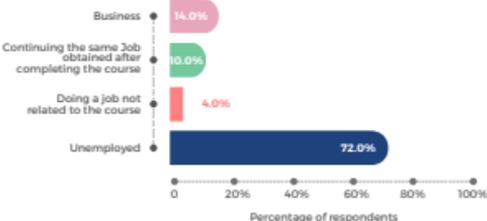


CHART 16: SALARY OF THE RESPONDENTS BEFORE AND AFTER JOINING THE COURSE

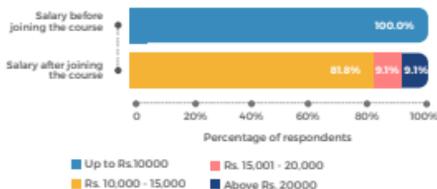
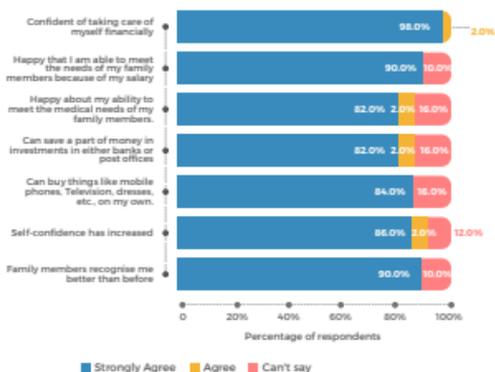


CHART 17: CHANGES EXPERIENCED DUE TO FINDING EMPLOYMENT



Even though Swayam Drive has made commendable strides in reducing unemployment, the stark reality remains that a significant majority (72%) are waiting for successful placement and employment opportunities post-intervention.

The program has led to a significant upward shift in income distribution, with a complete elimination of respondents earning up to Rs. 10,000. The substantial presence in the Rs. 10,000 - 15,000 bracket demonstrated the program's success in placing participants in mid-level income roles.

The employment opportunities provided by the Swayam Drive initiative have had a profound impact on the lives of participants. Firstly, a strikingly high percentage of respondents (98%) agreed that finding employment has made them confident in taking care of themselves financially. Similarly, a substantial majority (90%) expressed happiness in being able to meet the needs of their family members due to their salary, highlighting the program's role in improving familial well-being and socio-economic stability. Furthermore, a major section (82%) reported happiness about their ability to meet the medical needs of their family members, underscoring the program's contribution to enhanced healthcare access within households. Additionally, the data reflected a commendable financial literacy aspect, as a substantial majority (82%) indicated the ability to save money in investments. Furthermore, the observed increase in self-confidence (86%) among respondents is indicative of the program's positive psychological impact, fostering a sense of empowerment and self-assurance. Lastly, the noteworthy recognition from family members (90%) signified an improvement in social recognition and acceptance within the community, further emphasizing the benefits generated through the program.

CHART 18: SATISFACTION WITH THE WORKPLACE

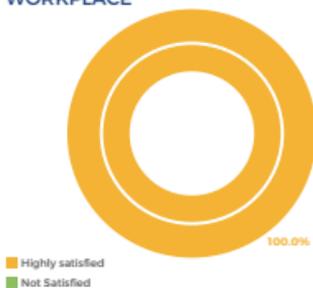


CHART 19: DURATION OF EMPLOYMENT IN THE PRESENT JOB

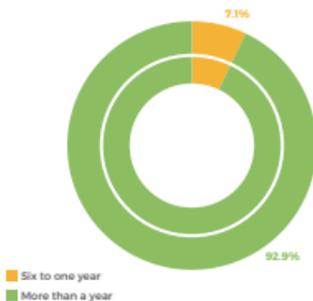

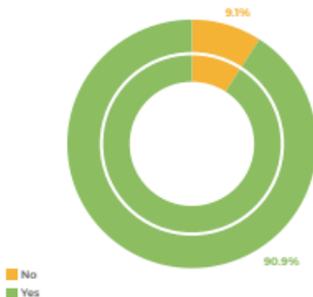
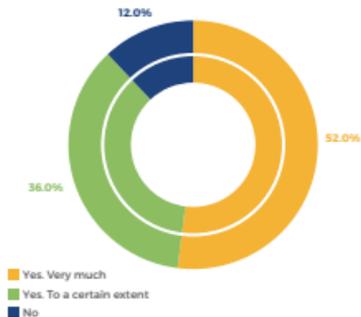


CHART 21: WHETHER THE RESPONDENTS HAD MADE THE RIGHT DECISION BY JOINING THE COURSE?

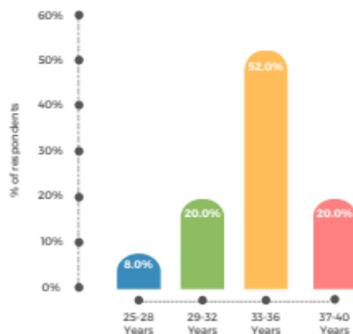


CHART 3: MONTHLY FAMILY INCOME

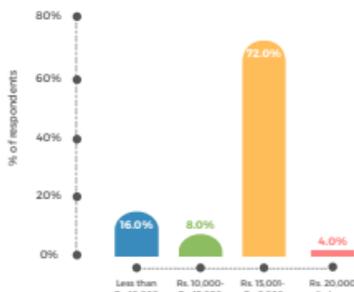


CHART 2: SOCIAL CATEGORY OF THE BENEFICIARY

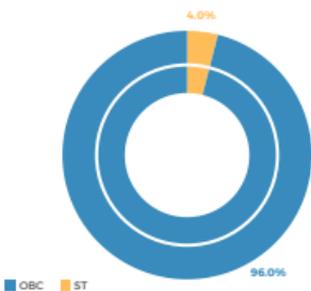
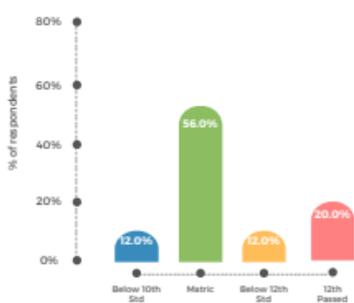


CHART 4: QUALIFICATION



The demography of the respondents comprised primarily women from diverse socio-economic backgrounds across various regions in India. The age distribution skewed towards the middle-aged group, particularly the 33-36 years bracket, which constituted more than half of the respondents (52%). The impact assessment revealed a demographic profile primarily consisting of individuals from the Other Backward Class (OBC) category, comprising most of the respondents (96%). In terms of financial status, a majority (72%) fell within the Rs.15,001 - Rs.20,000 income bracket. Educationally, the cohort exhibited diversity, with more than half (56%) having completed matriculation.

CHART 5: OCCUPATIONAL STATUS BEFORE JOINING THE COURSE

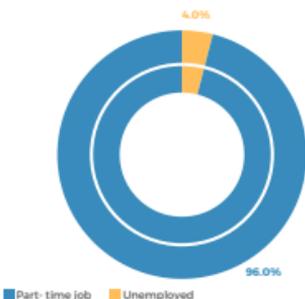
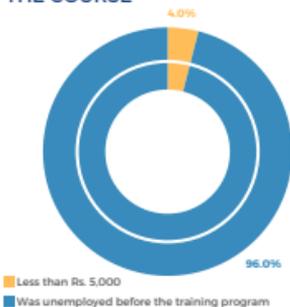


CHART 6: SALARY BEFORE JOINING THE COURSE



As per the quantitative survey, before joining the course, the majority of respondents (96%) were unemployed, with only the rest (4%) earning less than Rs. 5000/ with their part-time jobs.

The field survey showed that before the intervention, the targeted communities faced significant socio-economic challenges characterized by limited access to skill development opportunities and constrained economic prospects, particularly among women. The absence of adequate vocational training programs resulted in a workforce with underutilized potential and limited avenues for economic advancement. Additionally, prevailing disparities in education, income, and employment opportunities exacerbated existing inequalities, particularly among marginalized groups such as the Other Backward Class (OBC) population.

These pre-intervention conditions underscored the urgent need for comprehensive initiatives aimed at bridging the skill gap, enhancing employability, and fostering inclusive economic growth within the communities served by the program.

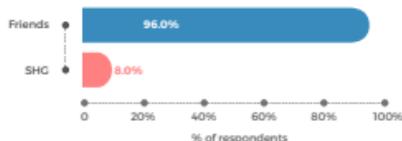

CHART 8: CERTIFICATION

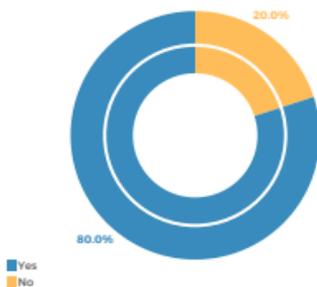


CHART 9: PLACEMENT SOURCE

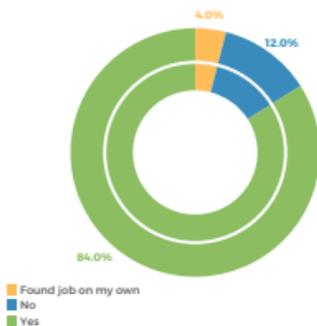
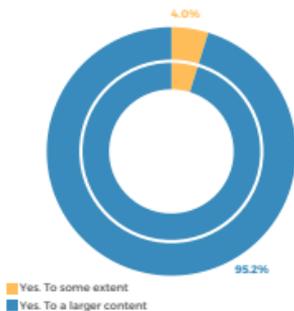
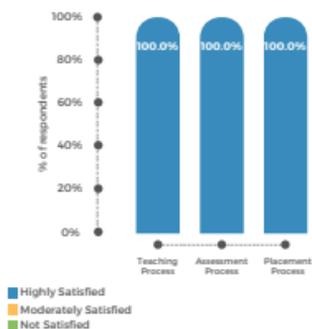


CHART 10: PLACEMENT AS PER MAPPED ASPIRATIONS

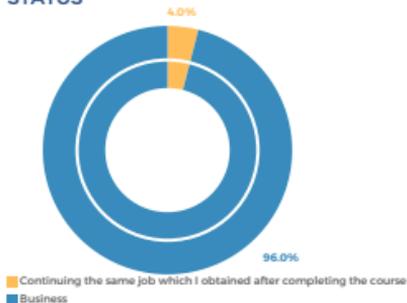
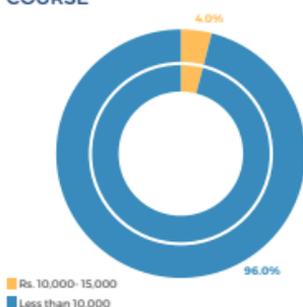
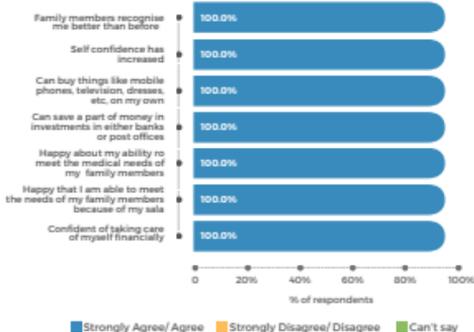
CHART 12: PRESENT EMPLOYMENT STATUS

The data indicated that the majority of respondents (96%) reported earning less than Rs. 10,000/- after joining the course, which underscored the prevailing income levels among participants post-training. Additionally, the vast majority of respondents (96.0%) were engaged in business activities, which indicated a strong inclination towards entrepreneurship among program participants. 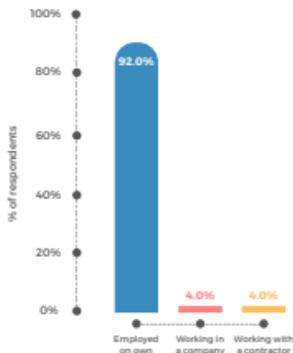
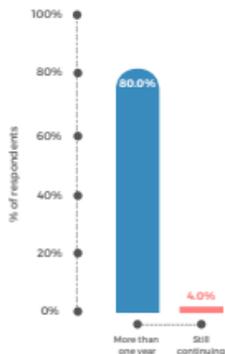
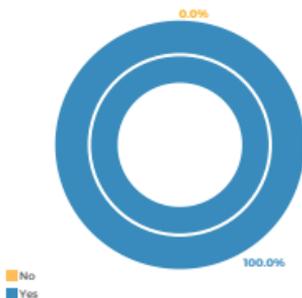
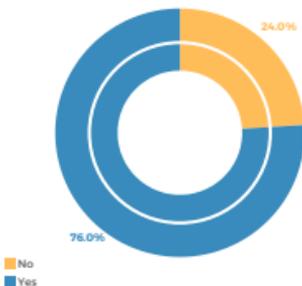
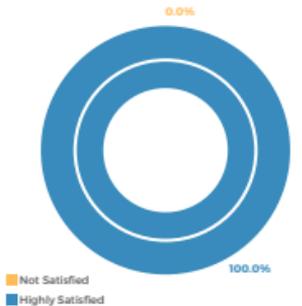
CHART 15: TYPE OF EMPLOYMENT

The majority of respondents (92%) were employed on their own, which demonstrated a high degree of self-reliance and entrepreneurship among program participants. A large proportion of respondents (80%) have been employed for more than one year after being placed by the centre, which indicated the sustainability and longevity of job placements facilitated by the program. All respondents (100.0%) indicated that they could relate the lessons learned in the training program to their practical work in the workplace, which reflected the alignment between training content and job requirements.

The majority of respondents (76%) remained in the same line of work they were placed in through the initiative, which indicated consistency and stability in their career trajectories post-training. 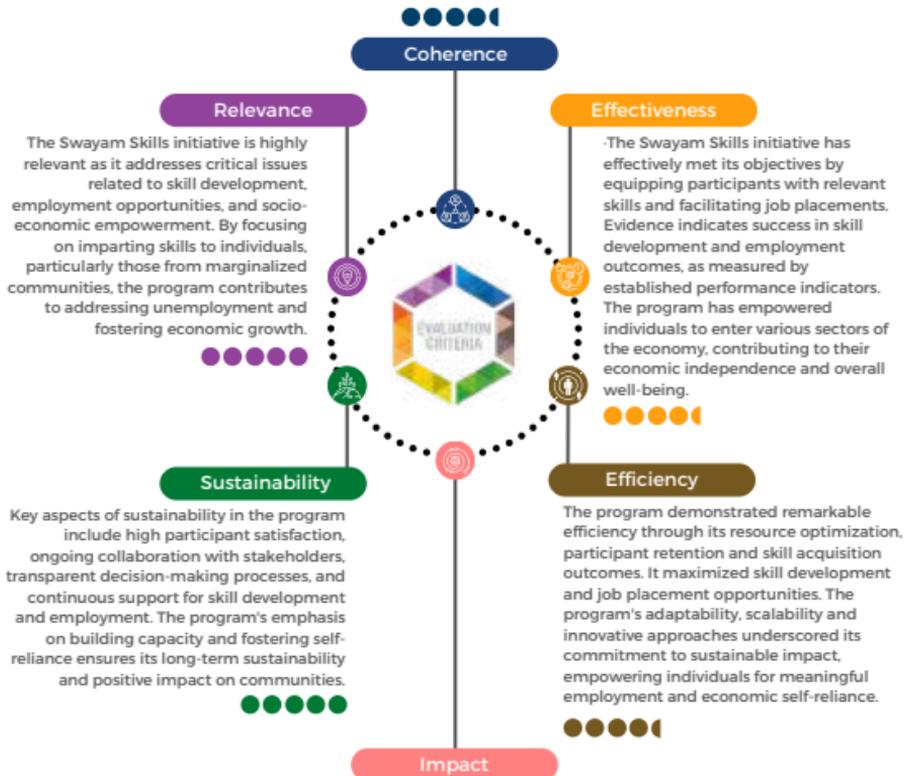

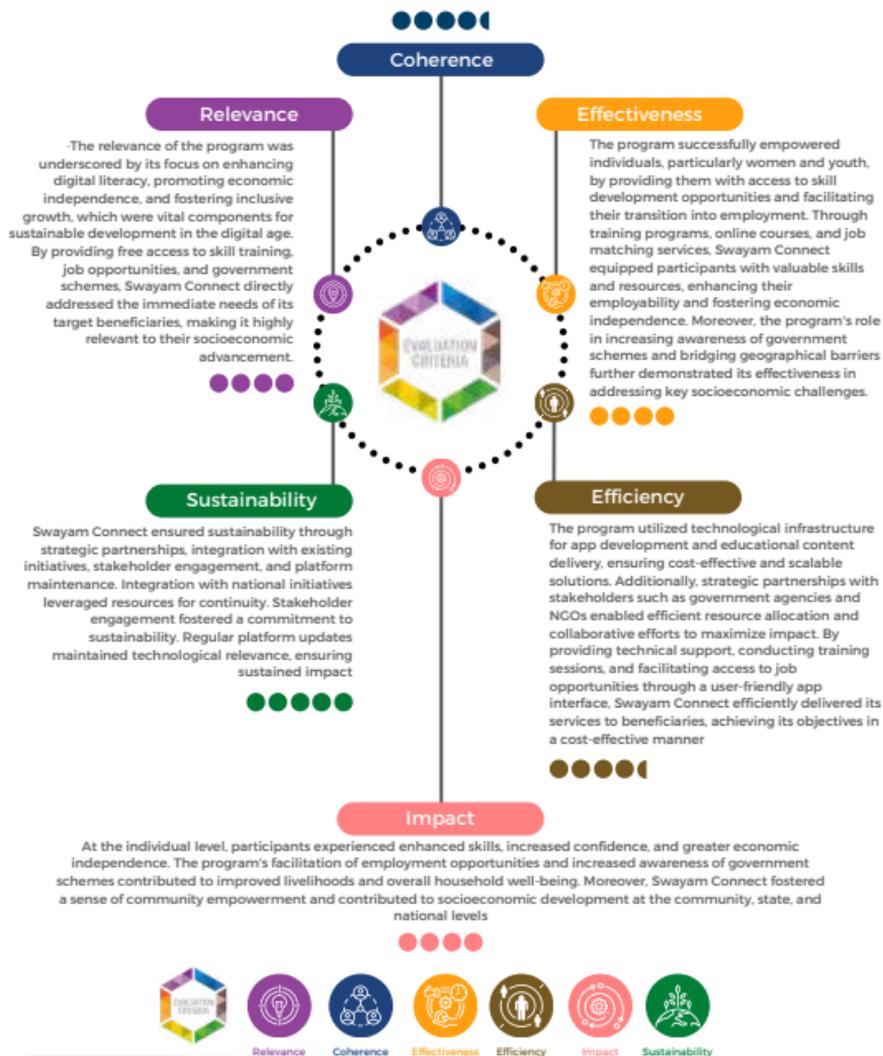

7. PEHLAY AKSHAR TEACHERS TRAINING AND SCHOOLING

7.1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Project Background

Despite high enrollment rates, over 70% of students in Class 3 lack basic reading and mathematics skills, which are fundamental for future learning. This deficiency highlights a significant gap in the quality of education provided, leading to a situation where students lack not only foundational skills but also curiosity and critical thinking abilities.

These poor learning outcomes have far-reaching consequences, as they persist throughout students' lives, limiting their future opportunities and success. Initiatives focused on enhancing English language skills, such as the foundation English program, play a crucial role in addressing this pressing issue. To address this gap, RCP supported Phelay Akshar to enable a teacher development program and an In-school program, focusing on enhancing foundational English learning outcomes among marginalised communities of Mumbai.

CHART 1: AGE GROUP DISTRIBUTION

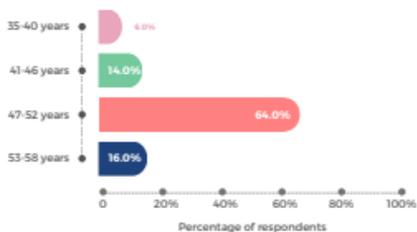


CHART 2: GENDER DISTRIBUTION

CHART 3: MODE OF TEACHER TRAINING COURSE ATTENDED

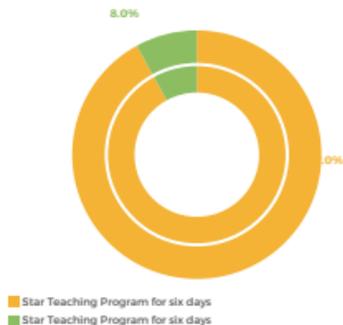


CHART 4: NO. OF SESSIONS ATTENDED DURING THE COURSE PERIOD

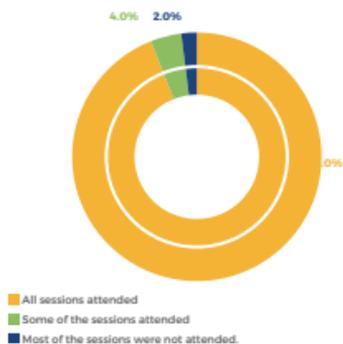
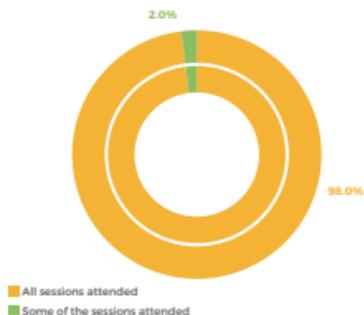


CHART 5: WHETHER THE REGULAR TEACHER ATTENDS ALL SAATHI SESSIONS

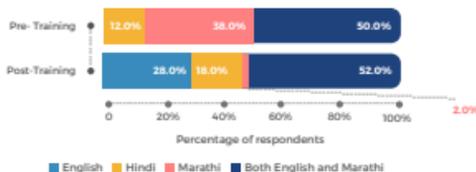


CHART 7: TEACHERS' ENGLISH SPEAKING SKILLS

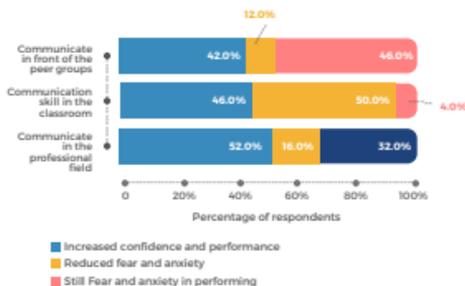
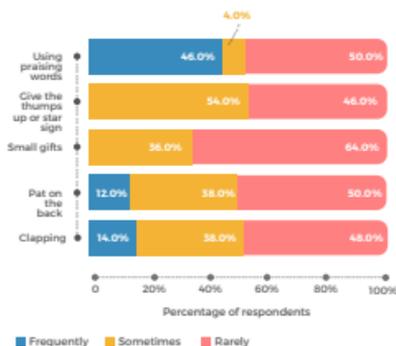


CHART 8: TYPE OF TECHNIQUES INTRODUCED IN THE MAGIC CLASSROOM SETTING

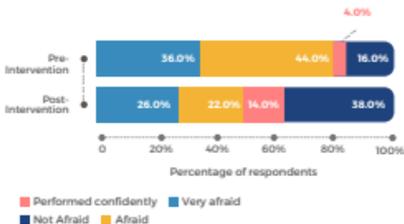

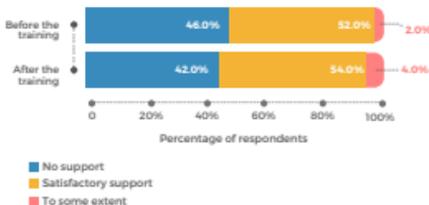

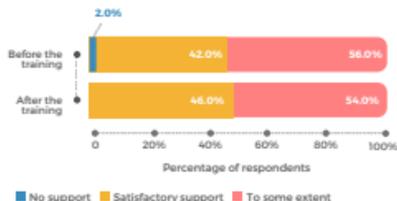

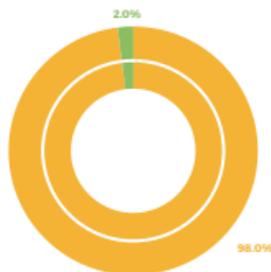

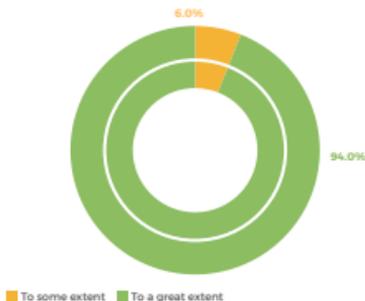
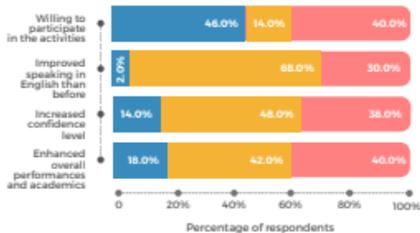


CHART 15: STUDENTS' RESPONSES/BEHAVIOURAL CHANGES AFTER THE PROGRAM

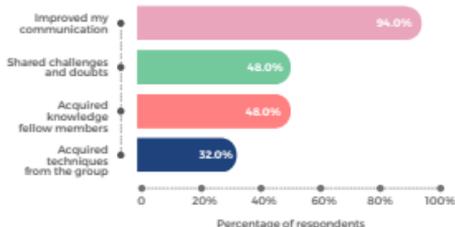
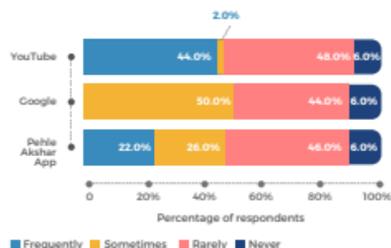


CHART 17: MEDIUM TAKEN IN CASE ANY SUPPORT IS NEEDED FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

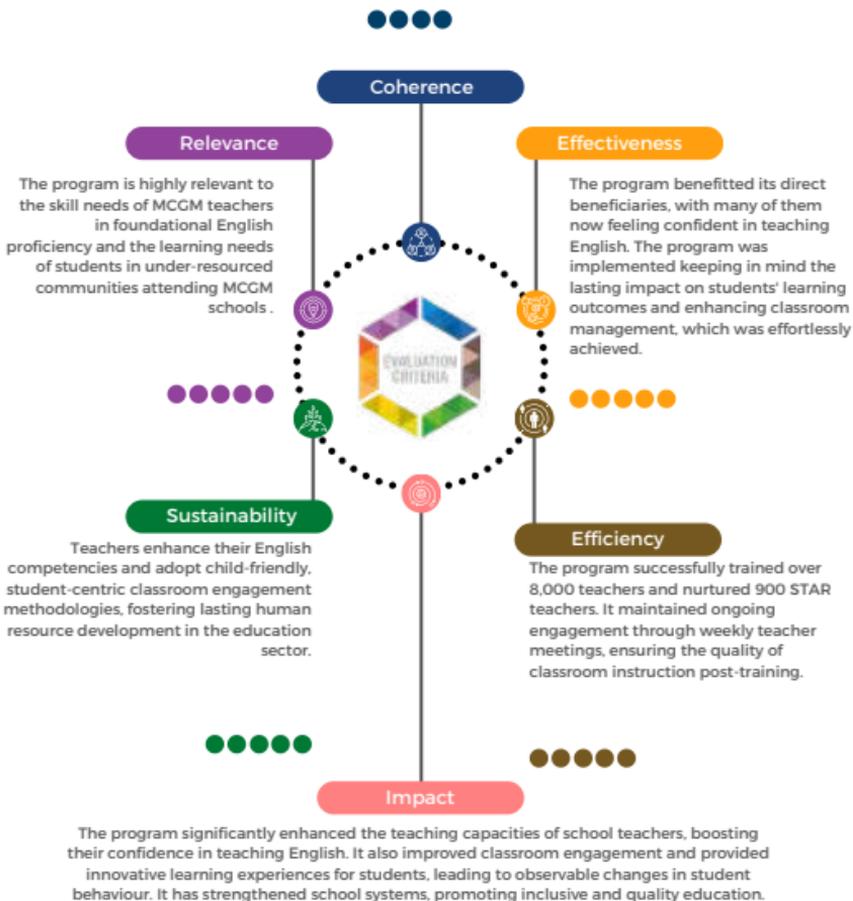

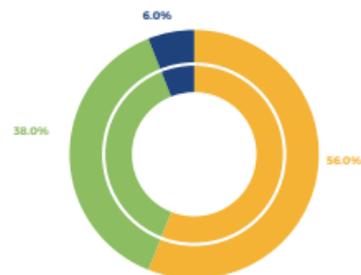

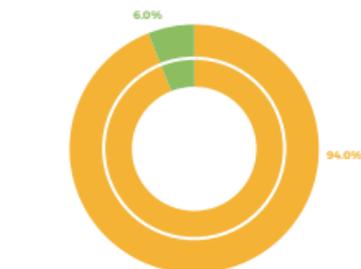

CHART 20: AVERAGE ACADEMIC SCORE IN ENGLISH LANGUAGE-BEFORE & AFTER PROGRAM

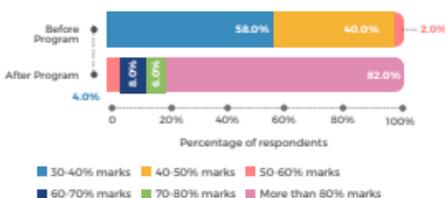
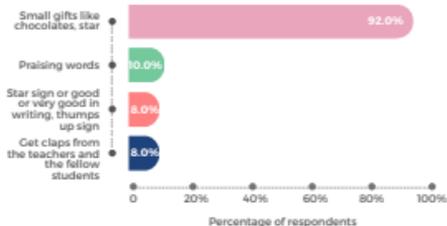

CHART 22: LANGUAGE IN WHICH THE STUDENTS PRESENT THEIR/ GROUP WORK IN ENGLISH CLASSES

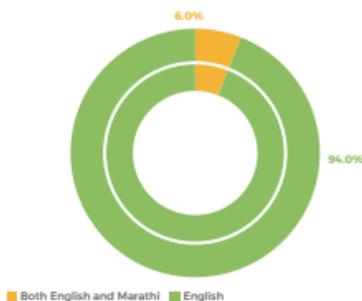
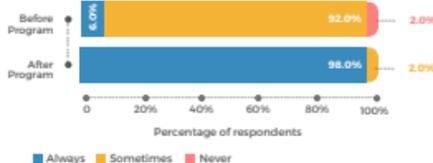

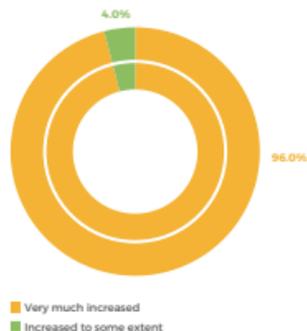

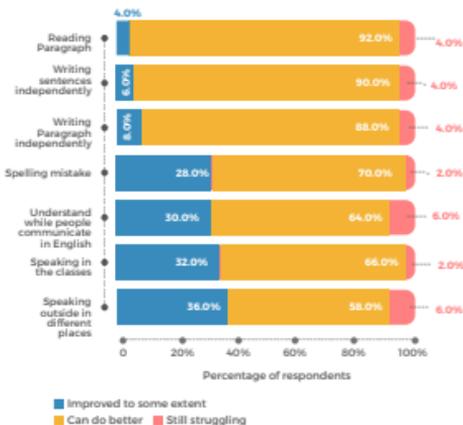

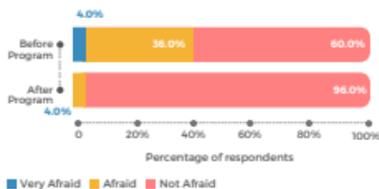

8.1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Project Background

In collaboration with RPG Foundation, KEC embarked on a significant Heritage Conservation project to revitalise the Banganga Precinct, Mumbai's oldest continuously inhabited site dating back to the 9th Century. Through a comprehensive revival plan, including infrastructure repair, debris clearance, mural art and installation of heritage-themed street lights, the project aimed to preserve the historical significance of the precinct, enhance its aesthetic appeal and promote cultural tourism. Through this initiative, KEC demonstrated its commitment to preserving national heritage and fostering community engagement.

Through meticulous data analysis and stakeholder feedback, this study shed light on the multifaceted success of the program, which emphasised its significance in promoting sustainable development, cultural preservation, and meaningful societal change.

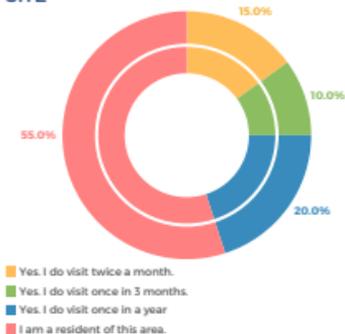
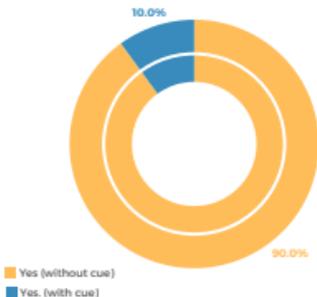


CHART 2: AWARENESS OF RENOVATION WORK



The data underscored the diverse site visitation patterns, with a notable portion of respondents identifying as residents (55%), which suggested varying levels of engagement with the site throughout the year. Secondly, the survey indicated a high level of spontaneous awareness

(90%) among respondents regarding the organisation that conducted the renovation, highlighting the effectiveness of communication strategies. These findings emphasised the importance of understanding visitor behaviour and successful community involvement in heritage conservation projects.



PRE-INTERVENTION

Before the intervention by KEC International Limited, the Banganga Heritage Precinct faced numerous challenges that hindered its cultural and social significance. Infrastructure such as stairways leading to the Banganga Tank was broken, surrounding walls were in disrepair, and debris cluttered the southern and northern ends of the precinct. Moreover, inadequate lighting left the precinct mostly dark at night, posing safety concerns and detracting from its aesthetic appeal. The lack of amenities and maintenance contributed to a decline in visitor engagement and limited the potential for cultural and heritage tourism. These challenges underscored the urgent need for intervention to revive the Banganga Heritage Precinct, restore its glory and enhance its accessibility and appeal for residents and visitors alike.

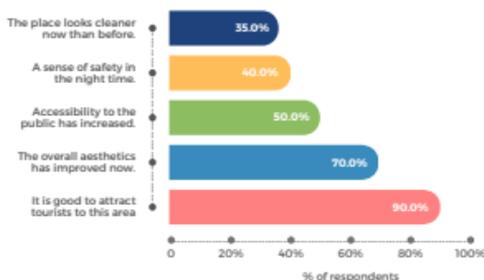


8.4 KEY PROJECT IMPACT

The revitalisation of the Banganga Precinct has transformed it into a cultural and heritage hub. Through infrastructure rehabilitation, community engagement, art preservation, information dissemination, capacity building, partnerships, and monitoring, the precinct has improved its historical significance and tourist attraction, fostering community pride and promoting sustainable development.

SITE CONDITIONS AND PRESERVATION

The majority of respondents (90%) expressed that the renovation works were good for attracting tourists to the area, followed by improvement in aesthetics (70%) and public accessibility (50%). Furthermore, the findings suggested a positive overall impact as respondents acknowledged improvements in safety and cleanliness in the area.

According to the qualitative survey, the intervention has led to a notable increase in public awareness about the heritage significance of Banganga and improved accessibility and safety measures. Through initiatives such as wall paintings, informative signboards, and enhanced lighting, visitors are now more informed about the historical context of the site. This increased awareness has contributed to a greater appreciation for Banganga's heritage and cultural significance. Moreover, the repair works on steps and walls have improved accessibility, making the site more navigable and safer for visitors, especially at night.

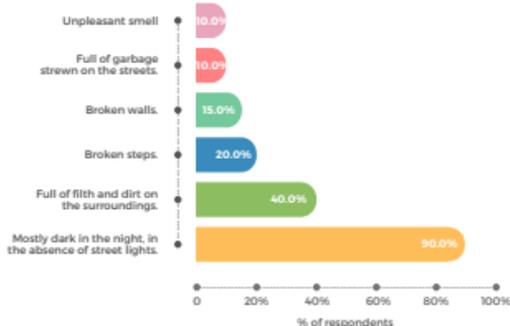

The majority of respondents (90%) described the area as mostly dark at night due to the absence of street lights. Additionally, a little less than half of the respondents (40%) mentioned that the precincts were full of filth and dirt in the surroundings. These findings highlighted various challenges in the condition of the temple tank precincts before the renovation work, including issues related to infrastructure maintenance and hygiene.

The qualitative study showed that the site conditions at Banganga have seen significant improvement following the intervention by the RPG group. Previously, the precincts were characterised by poor lighting, broken infrastructure, and a lack of cleanliness. However, with the introduction of new street lamps, repair works on broken steps and walls, and enhanced cleanliness measures, the overall ambience of the area has improved noticeably. The preservation efforts have contributed to creating a more inviting and aesthetically pleasing environment for visitors.

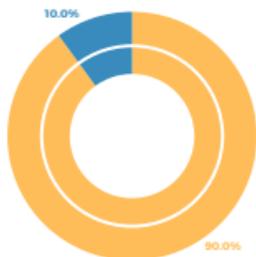

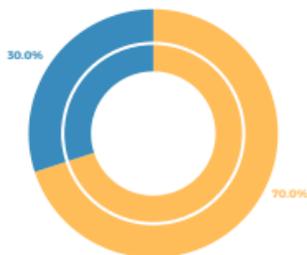

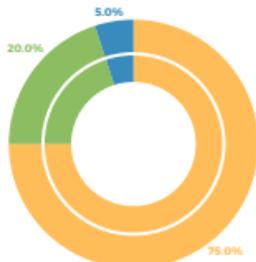

Most of the respondents (90%) reported that accessibility to the temple tank had increased very much due to the repair work. Additionally, a significant majority of respondents (70%) indicated that the safety of the precincts has increased very much compared to before. Furthermore, the majority of respondents (75%) expressed that the street signages were helpful to a larger extent for first-time visitors. Overall, the findings suggested a substantial improvement in various aspects of the precincts that indicated a positive impact of the repair works on the overall experience and perception created.

CHART 8: LEVEL OF SATISFACTION WITH THE REPAIR WORK DONE ON THE TANK STEPS

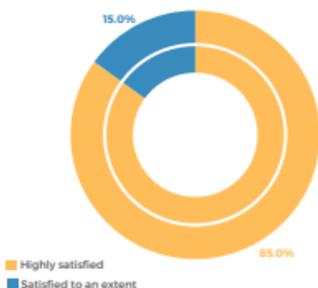


CHART 11: LEVEL OF SATISFACTION WITH THE LIGHT FIXTURES ON ART WALLS

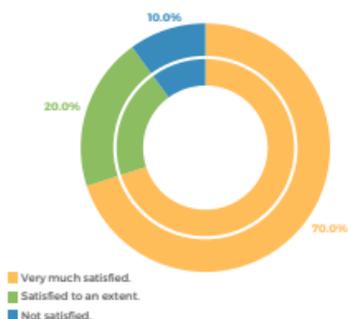


CHART 9: OPINION ON THE WALL PAINTINGS

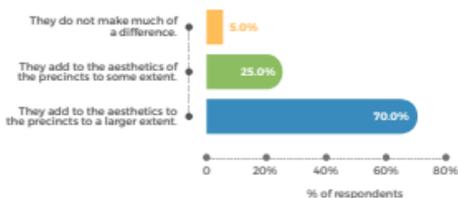

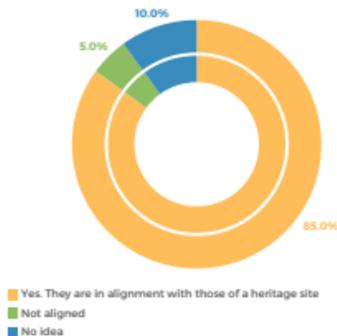
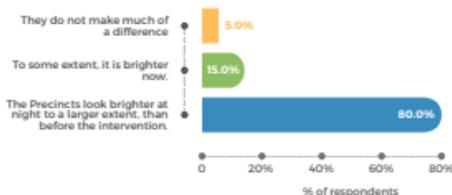


CHART 10: OPINION ON THE NEWLY INSTALLED STREET LIGHTS



The data from the survey revealed overwhelmingly positive sentiments towards various aspects of the renovation works. Regarding the repair work done on the tank steps, a majority of respondents (85%) expressed high satisfaction levels. Similarly, respondents appreciated the aesthetic enhancement provided by wall paintings in the precincts, as the majority (70%) expressed that they significantly contributed to the aesthetics. Additionally, the installation of new street lights received positive feedback, as most of the respondents (80%) noted a significant improvement in brightness at night. Satisfaction levels with the light fixtures on art walls were also high, as the majority (70%) expressed very high satisfaction. Furthermore, the majority of respondents (85%) believed that the renovation works were in Alignment with the requirements of a heritage site, underscoring a positive perception overall.

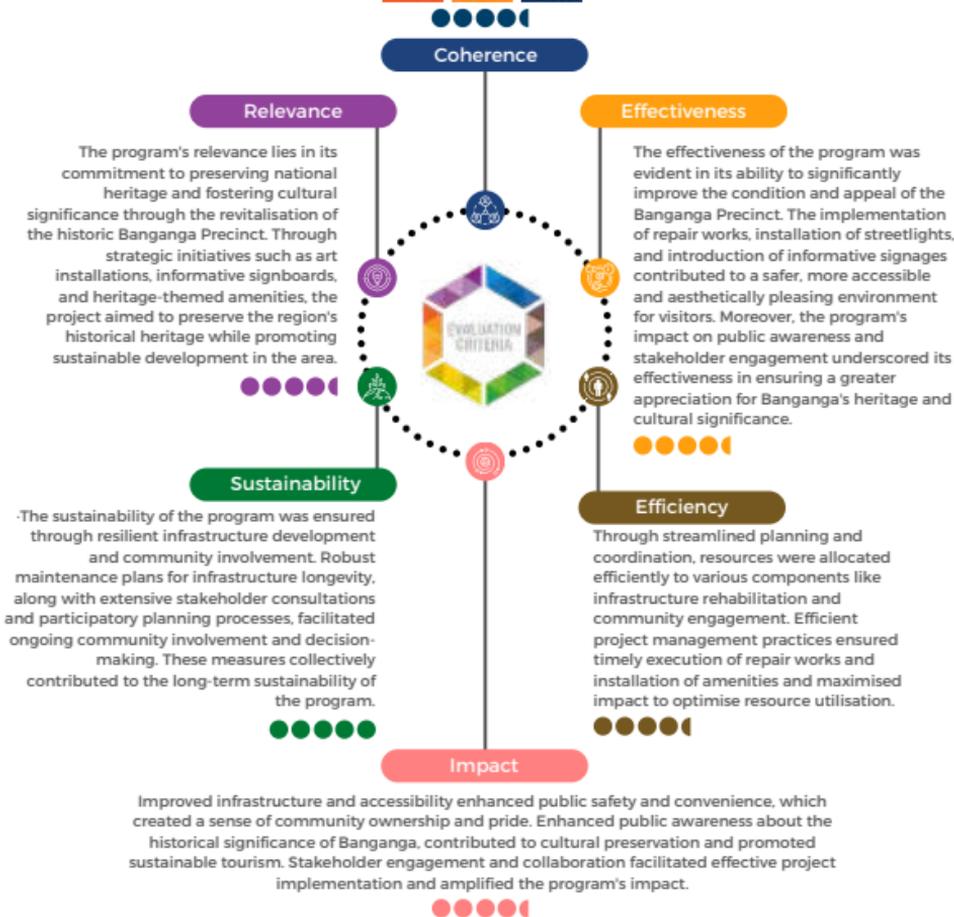

To boost visitor engagement, targeted marketing campaigns and leverage social media could be launched to promote the precinct's cultural significance. Collaboration with tourism agencies and local businesses for joint promotional activities could be made aimed at positioning Banganga as a must-visit cultural destination in Mumbai. The 'Amble' walking application could be promoted through various channels to increase awareness and encourage its adoption among visitors.

8.6 CONCLUSION

In conclusion, the revitalisation project at Banganga Precinct has been a transformative endeavour that revitalised this historically significant site into a vibrant cultural and heritage hub. Through comprehensive infrastructure rehabilitation, community engagement and preservation efforts, the project has not only enhanced the site's historical significance but also improved accessibility, safety and public awareness. Stakeholder engagement and positive community perception underscored the success of the intervention, which reflected a collaborative approach toward cultural preservation and sustainable development. Moving forward, continued efforts in maintenance, community involvement and leveraging innovative tools like the 'Amble' walking application could be essential to sustain the positive impact and further elevate the precinct's status as a cultural landmark.

9. FEVER CLINICS

9.1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Project Background

In collaboration with the RPG Foundation, KEC aimed to establish and operate fever clinics as independent facilities dedicated to screening and managing patients with fever or respiratory symptoms, including potential COVID-19 cases in line with the National Health Mission (NHM). These fever clinics were strategically located away from main medical facilities to ensure patient isolation and minimise cross-contamination. Infection prevention and control measures, including the use of personal protective equipment (PPE) and adherence to biomedical waste management rules, were strictly observed. The roles and responsibilities of healthcare personnel, operational protocols, and clinic components were outlined to ensure efficient clinic management.

Project Activities



Establishment of independent fever clinics away from main medical facilities.



Installation of clear signage and separate entrances for fever clinics.



Implementation of physical distancing measures in fever clinic waiting areas.



Screening of all patients with fever or respiratory symptoms, including potential COVID-19 cases.

9.2 PROJECT INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND AND NEED OF THE PROGRAM

The program was established to address the urgent need for a dedicated healthcare facility to manage fever and respiratory symptoms, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic. With the aim of early detection, testing, and treatment of infectious diseases, including COVID-19, the program sought to provide a centralised and accessible location for individuals experiencing fever or respiratory symptoms to receive timely medical attention. Recognising the importance of preventing the spread of contagious illnesses within healthcare facilities and the wider community, the program emphasised implementing rigorous infection prevention and control measures. By establishing fever clinics equipped with appropriate medical resources and staffed by trained healthcare professionals, the program aimed to enhance the healthcare system's capacity to manage and mitigate the impact of infectious disease outbreaks effectively.

CHART 1: AGE-WISE DISTRIBUTION

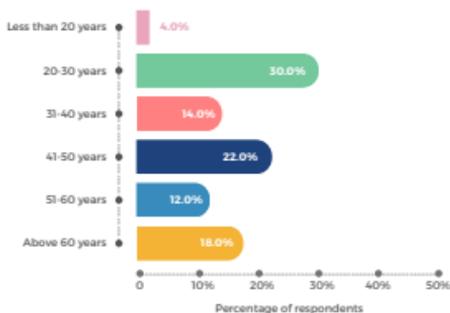


CHART 2: OCCUPATION OF THE RESPONDENT

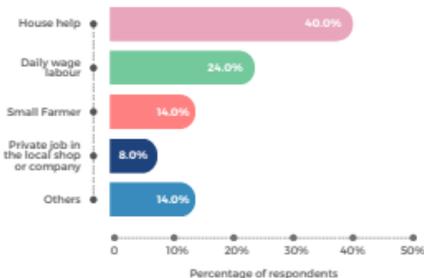
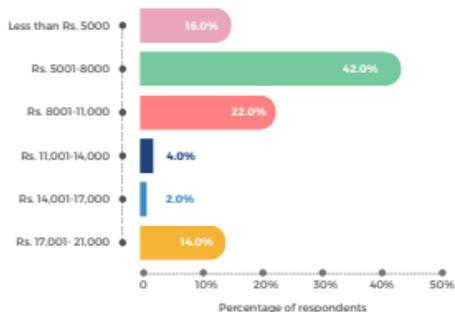


CHART 3: APPROX MONTHLY INCOME OF THE FAMILY



The data provided offered a comprehensive insight into the demographics of the respondents and revealed a diverse range of age groups, occupations and income brackets. In terms of age distribution, the 20-30 years age group was the most prominent (30%), while middle-aged individuals aged 31-50 years collectively represented a substantial portion (36%). Other professions included driving, selling small daily items, working in the unorganised sector and those who have retired. Regarding occupational distribution, house help emerged as the most prevalent occupation (40%), followed by daily wage labourers (24%). The most prevalent income bracket was Rs. 5001-8000 (42%), followed by Rs. 8001-11,000 (22%).



PRE-INTERVENTION

Before the implementation of the fever clinic initiative during the COVID-19 pandemic, the healthcare system faced significant challenges to effectively manage the influx of patients with fever and respiratory symptoms. With no dedicated fever clinics in place, hospitals and healthcare facilities struggled to separate suspected COVID-19 cases from other patients, which led to potential cross-contamination and increased transmission risks. The lack of specialised infrastructure for fever screening and testing resulted in long waiting times and overcrowding in emergency departments, which only hindered timely diagnosis and treatment. Additionally, the absence of standardised protocols for managing fever cases contributed to inconsistencies in patient care and limited capacity to effectively contain the spread of the virus. These pre-intervention challenges underscored the urgent need for dedicated fever clinics to streamline the triage process, improve infection control measures and enhance the overall response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

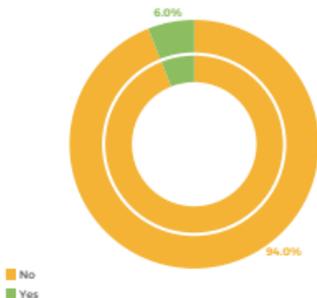

9.4 KEY PROJECT IMPACT

The project's impact was evident across various facets of community healthcare and infrastructure. Through disease detection and diagnosis outreach efforts, the project significantly identified and managed COVID-19 cases, with a focus on prompt testing and understanding the severity of illness. The project also positively impacted the quality of healthcare services, with swift recovery and perceived effectiveness of treatment, as reported by the majority of respondents. Stakeholder engagement and perception subsequently highlighted the clinic's vital role in addressing community healthcare needs.

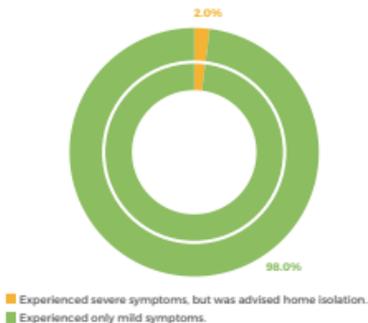
DISEASE DETECTION AND DIAGNOSIS (OUTREACH)

CHART 4: TESTING OF THE VIRUS



According to the field interviews, the fever clinic was equipped with essential amenities to facilitate efficient testing procedures. These included chairs for patient seating, a sturdy examination table, a privacy-enhancing curtain, a fully functional wash basin, a comfortable bed with a mattress for patient examination, a ceiling fan for ventilation, a storage cupboard for medical supplies, a window for communication and document exchange, a scanner for documentation purposes, and a testing kit for conducting COVID-19 tests. The presence of these amenities ensured a conducive environment for both patients and healthcare staff to facilitate smooth clinic operations.

CHART 5: SEVERITY OF ILLNESS



The majority of respondents (94%) reported not testing positive for COVID-19, which indicated a small proportion of individuals who contracted the virus. Furthermore, the data shed light on the severity of illness experienced by the respondents, as an overwhelming majority (98%) reported only mild symptoms, which implied the spectrum of illness severity experienced.

PRE-INTERVENTION SITUATION

The absence of specialised clinics during the pre-intervention situation, as understood from the survey, created challenges in efficiently managing and treating individuals with fever symptoms, which led to increased strain on healthcare facilities and potentially hindered the timely identification and containment of infectious diseases.



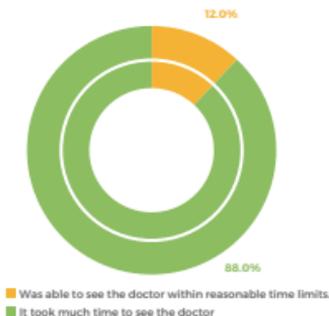
We saw an average of 1000 patients every day. Our clinic setup was equipped with all the necessary facilities and strictly followed COVID-19 guidelines. The staff members wore protective gear, and testing results were usually available within 24 hours. Overall, the clinic has been a great service for the public, and I'm proud to be a part of it."

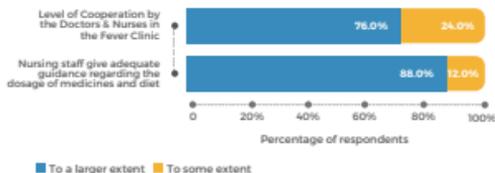
ACCESSIBILITY & AFFORDABILITY

Concerning the waiting time to see the doctor, the majority (88%) reported excessive waiting times, which suggested a high volume of patients in need of medical attention at the clinic. Regarding cooperation from healthcare professionals at the fever clinic, a significant majority experienced a high level of cooperation from the doctors who listened to symptoms patiently (76%) and received guidance on medicines and diet from nursing staff (88%).

CHART 7: LEVEL OF COOPERATION BY THE DOCTORS & NURSES IN THE FEVER CLINIC



The qualitative survey revealed that all respondents received free medicine from the clinic, which indicated an accessible healthcare service. Additionally, all of them shared that the fever clinic demonstrated strict adherence to COVID-19 Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), which reflected a commitment to maintaining safety and hygiene standards. The clinic's floor was cleaned twice daily to ensure optimal cleanliness, while physical distancing measures were rigorously enforced to minimise the risk of viral transmission among patients and staff. Additionally, all staff members diligently utilised personal protective equipment (PPE), including masks, gloves, sanitisers, and headgear, to mitigate the spread of infection. These measures contributed to creating a safe and secure environment for patients seeking COVID-19 testing services.



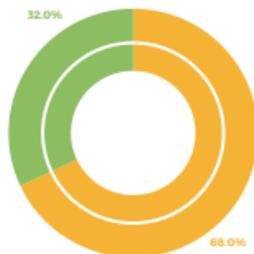
"Our clinic categorised patients based on severity, with mild cases being the most common. Immediate actions for positive cases included sending ambulances and notifying authorities. For mild cases, we prescribed home isolation, while for moderate and severe cases, we were hospitalised. We provided continuing medical support for home-isolated patients and referred hospital cases to the District Hospital in Akola. I am very grateful for this initiative"

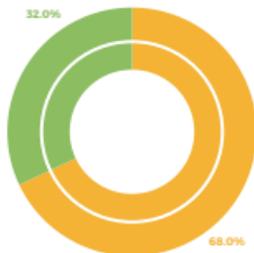

A significant majority (68%) experienced a swift recuperation following medical advice. This indicates varying perceptions among respondents regarding the speed of their recovery, with implications for healthcare practices and patient outcomes. Similarly, a majority (68%) perceived the treatment at the clinic as highly effective, which suggested a positive perception of the treatment outcome.



"Along with two other nurses, we managed the clinic from morning 9 am to 7 pm. Our daily responsibilities included conducting COVID testing, maintaining records, and ensuring cleanliness. Despite the manageable patient crowd, we faced challenges such as shortages of gloves and masks. I'm satisfied with the clinic setup, but adding a shed for protection from sun and rain would be beneficial."

CHART 10: EXTENT TO WHICH THE CROWD MANAGEMENT IN THE FEVER CLINIC DONE

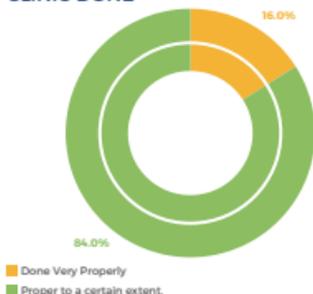


CHART 11: EXTENT TO WHICH THE PHYSICAL DISTANCING MAINTAINED

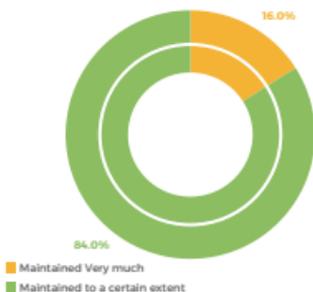
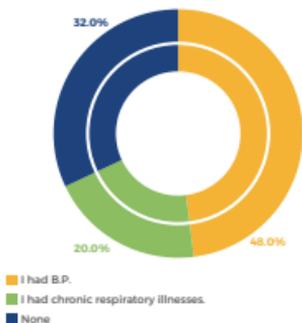


CHART 12: CO-MORBIDITY



As an adopted measure towards raising awareness, a majority (84%) felt that it was conducted 'proper to a certain extent,' which reflected an acknowledgement of adequacy in crowd management practices. Similarly, regarding physical distancing, the majority (84%) perceived it was 'maintained to a certain extent'. Shifting focus to comorbid conditions, less than half of the respondents (48%) reported high blood pressure as a co-morbidity. This distribution highlighted the levels of awareness that were raised towards preventive measures, as well as the impact of co-morbidities on COVID-19 outcomes, to guide improvements in healthcare practices and interventions.

As a part of the field study, it was found that the clinic operated within a structured timetable and ensured the presence of at least one doctor and two nurses during testing hours. This organisational framework optimised operational efficiency and facilitated prompt patient care

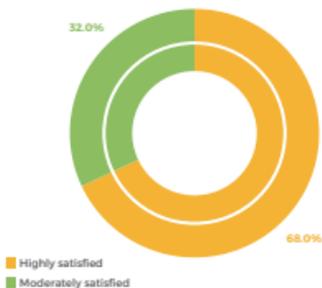

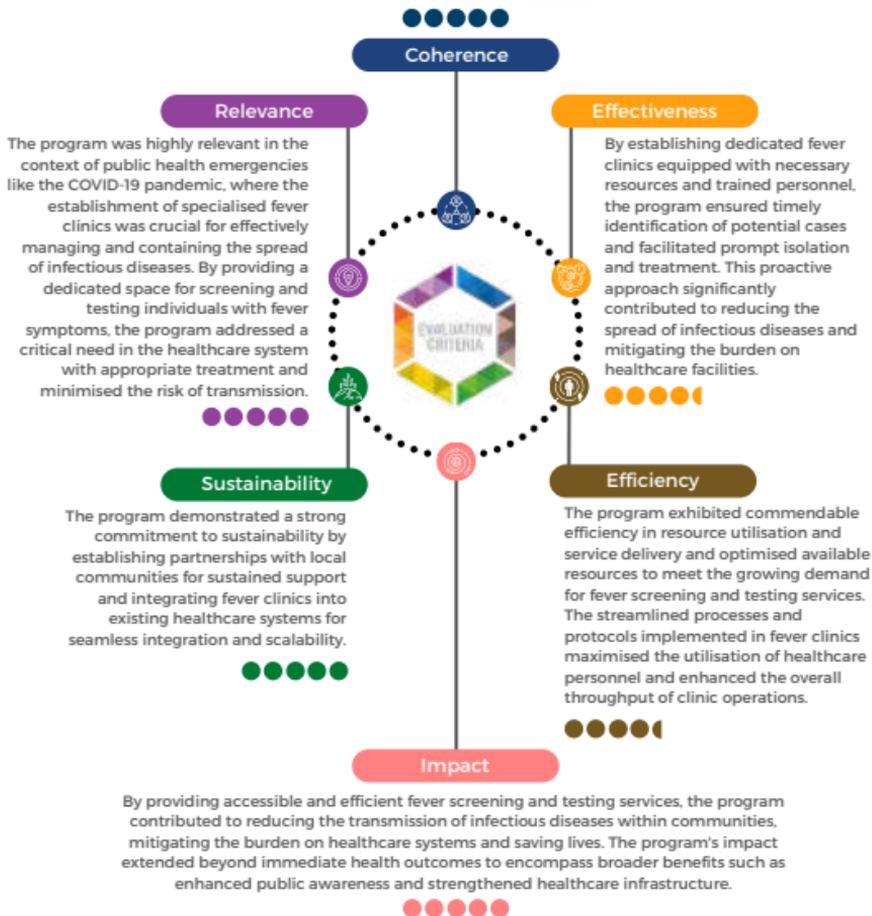

The Way Forward
